CLASSICAL FORMULAE FOR THE MODERN WORLD

Heaven has three Treasures: The Sun, the Moon and the Stars. Earth possesses three Treasures: Water, Fire and Soil. A human being is enlightened by three Treasures: Jing, Qi and Shen. Wise application of these Treasures liberates us to Eternity.

Arouse Power – Tonify Kidney-Yang and Heart-Qi, calm the Mind

Bend Bamboo - Nourish Liver-Blood and subdue Liver-Yang

Benefit the Sinews - Invigorate Blood, resolve Phleam, expel Wind-Dampness, dry Dampness

Break into a Smile - Move Liver-Qi, tonify Spleen-Qi

Breaking Clouds - Tonify Spleen-Qi, move Qi

Brighten the Eyes - Nourish Liver-Blood and Kidney-Yin, benefit the eyes

Bright Spirit - Move Liver- and Heart-Qi, calm the Mind, resolve Phlegm

Brocade Sinews - Expel Wind-Damp, nourish Liver-Blood

Buddha's Hand - Moves Qi in the Middle Burner, resolves Dampness

Calm the Shen – Tonify Spleen-Qi and Heart-Blood, calm the Mind

Central Mansion - Tonify Spleen- and Stomach-Qi and -Yin, resolve Dampness

Chemo-Support - Tonify Qi, nourish Yin and cool Blood

Children's Herbal Sentinel – Tonify Qi, raise immunity and strengthen digestion

Clear Channels – Resolve Damp-Heat from joints

Clear Lustre - Clear Heat, resolve Dampness, expel Wind

Clear Metal - Clear Lung- and Stomach-Heat, clear Heat at Qi or Ying level

Clear Qi - Descend Lung-Qi, stop wheezing

Clear the Root - Drain Damp-Heat, tonify Qi, nourish Yin

Clear the Soul - Clear Phlegm-Heat, relax the chest

Clear Yang - Subdue Liver-Yang, extinguish Liver-Wind, resolve Phlegm

Drain Fields - Resolve Dampness

Drain Fire - Clear Liver- and Heart-Fire, resolve Damp-Heat, calm the Mind

Ease the Muscles - Clear Damp-Heat, harmonize the Centre

Expel Toxic Heat – Resolve Toxic Heat from the three Burners

Expel Wind-Cold - Release the Exterior, expel Wind-Cold

Expel Wind-Heat – Release the Exterior, expel Wind-Heat

Freeing the Sun - Pacify the Liver, move Qi, clear Liver-Heat, calm the Mind







Glorious Sea – Nourish Liver-Blood, resolve Dampness, cool Blood Heat and benefit the skin

Harmonize the Centre – Tonify Qi and Yin of Stomach and Spleen, resolve Phlegm

Herbal Sentinel - Yang - Tonify Lung-, Spleen- and Wei-Qi

Open the Heart - Move and regulate Qi in the chest, calm the Mind

Peaceful Sunset - Drain Liver-Fire, resolve Phlegm, invigorate Blood

Prosperous Earth - Tonify Spleen-Qi

Radio-Support - Tonify Qi, nourish Blood and Yin, move and cool Blood

Red Stirring – Move Qi- and Blood-stasis in the chest, calm the Mind

Release Constraint - Eliminate Qi stagnation, calm the Mind and lift the mood

Root the Spirit - Nourish Liver-Blood and Liver-Yin, calm the Mind

Searching Soul - Tonify Kidney-Yang, nourish Liver-Blood, strengthen Will-Power

Separate Clear and Turbid - Resolve Dampness, promote urination, tonify Qi

Settling the Soul - Drain Fire, open the Mind's orifices, calm the Mind

Smooth Passage – Tonify Spleen-Qi and regulate the Liver

Soothe the Centre - Strengthen Spleen-Qi and Stomach-Yin, resolve Dampness, move Qi

Soothe the Shen – Tonify Qi and Yin of Heart, Lungs and Liver, calm the Mind, lift mood

Strengthen the Root – Strengthen Kidney-Yang, Blood and Jing

Tonify Qi and Ease the Muscles - Tonify Qi, raise the Yang and resolve Dampness

Water Passages - Resolve Dampness and clear Heat from Bladder, tonify the Kidneys

Welcome Fragrance - Open the nose, clear Damp Heat, expel Wind

NOTE: Please note that the manual uses the pharmacological names of the herbs e.g. *Radix Rehmanniae* which is the correct method for medicinal herbs. The pharmacological names used are in line with Bensky D., & Stöger E. (2004) Materia Medica (3rd edition), Eastland Press, Seattle. The Latin names used on the labels may differ from country to country.







Introduction to the Three Treasures®

The Three Treasures® remedies can be classified into the following categories:

- Nourishing
- Nourishing and Clearing
- Clearing
- Calming the Mind
- Releasing the Exterior

It is important to understand whether a remedy tonifies the body's Qi, resolves pathogenic factors or does both. It is only by understanding this classification that we can make a rational choice of a remedy.

Nourishing remedies are chosen in Empty conditions; clearing remedies are chosen in Full conditions with pathogenic factors; nourishing and clearing remedies are selected when there is a combination of a Full and an Empty condition.

Within each category, each formula addresses the disharmony of a specific organ. However, the innovative aspect of the *Three Treasures®* line of products is that, rather than being generic formulae (with the exception of the two formulae treating side-effects of chemotherapy and radiotherapy), each one addresses a specific and clinically common condition within a particular organ's sphere. For example, there is no generic formula to nourish Qi and Blood (e.g. Ba Zhen Tang *Eight Precious Pill*), but there are specific formulae which affect Liver-Blood either by nourishing it or by combining its nourishing with some elimination for specific clinical situations.

These are:

- Liver-Blood deficiency giving rise to Liver-Yang rising headaches (Bend Bamboo™)
- Deficient Liver-Blood not nourishing the eyes (Brighten the Eyes™)
- Deficient Liver-Blood not nourishing the sinews (Brocade Sinews™)
- Liver-Blood deficiency associated with Liver-Qi stagnation (Freeing the Moon®)
- Liver-Blood deficiency in chronic skin diseases (Glorious Sea™)
- Liver-Blood deficiency leading to insomnia (Root the Spirit and Nourish the Soul™)
- Liver-Blood deficiency resulting from radiotherapy (Radio-Support™).

Thus, the clinical application process for the *Three Treasures*® line is somewhat different from that for generic tonic formulae. It relies on the practitioner's making a fundamental differentiation between the need to tonify only, the need to clear only, or the need to tonify and clear simultaneously. We can represent the different diagnostic processes that lead to the choice of a formula (in this example for Liver-Blood deficiency) with Figures 1 and 2:








Similarly, Spleen-Qi deficiency hardly ever occurs on its own in chronic conditions as it is more frequently accompanied by Dampness, Damp-Heat or Qi Stagnation. Two more diagrams can illustrate the difference between a generic formula to tonify Spleen-Qi and the various *Three Treasures*[®] formulae to tonify Spleen-Qi. See Figures 3 and 4:

Overview of the Three Treasures® Formulae by Category

The following is a brief overview of each formula. For more detailed information and the clinical application of each, please consult the website www.three-treasures. com. Although each formula is intended for quite specific clinical situations (e.g. *Tonify Qi and Ease the Muscles* for chronic fatigue syndrome with Dampness in the muscles and Qi deficiency), its use need not be limited to those situations. In fact, each formula can be used for a very wide variety of conditions provided that they match the patterns envisaged for it.

Moreover, a mental-emotional pattern is provided for each formula. Provided the diagnosis of the prevailing pattern or patterns is correct, the treatment of specific clinical conditions is not contrary to the treatment of the whole person. For example, the formula *Welcome Fragrance*, which is designed for chronic sinusitis, can also be used to open the mind's orifices, helping the patient to discriminate between issues and to attain clarity of thought.

To facilitate the diagnosis and the correct choice of formula I have included at least one tongue picture for most formulae. It should be stressed that these photographs show only the most typical tongue conditions corresponding to the relevant formula, but they are by no means the only ones. In other words, if a patient's tongue does not look exactly as the photograph in this book, it does not necessarily mean that that particular formula is not applicable to that patient.

The following is an explanation of each formula by category:

Nourishing

The nourishing formulae tonify the vital substances of Qi, Yang, Blood or Yin and strengthen resistance to disease.

Nourish the Root™ is a variation of Zuo Gui Wan Restoring the Left [Kidney] Pill, a prescription to nourish Kidney-Yin. This was chosen as the main formula to nourish Kidney-Yin as, on the basis of clinical experience, it is better suited to Western patients than the more famous Liu Wei Di Huang Wan Six-Ingredient Rehmannia Pill.

Strengthen the Root™ is a variation of the You Gui Wan Restoring the Right [Kidney] Pill, a prescription to tonify Kidney-Yang. This was chosen in preference to Jin Gui Shen Qi Wan Golden Chest Kidney-Qi Pill as it provides a broader therapeutic range.

The two *Herbal Sentinel* formulae are designed to tonify the vital force and strengthen the immune system, thus raising resistance to disease. *Herbal Sentinel-Yang™* tonifies Yang and *Herbal Sentinel-Yin™* nourishes Yin. They are designed respectively for people of Yang or Yin constitution respectively.







The **Children's Herbal Sentinel™** remedy performs the same functions as the above but is specifically adapted for children, bearing in mind their unique physiological and pathological characteristics.

The formula **Brighten the Eyes™** is for a wide range of eye problems stemming from a deficiency of Liver-Blood and Kidneys; this is the most common pattern at the root of chronic eye problems in practice. With the appropriate pattern presentation, it may also be used for other symptoms centred on the head such as dizziness or headaches.

The remedy **Glorious Sea™** moistens and improves the lustre and texture of the skin for those who suffer from a deficiency of Liver-Blood and Kidneys. Again, this is the most common pathological background of chronic skin diseases. However, the formula can also be used in the absence of actual skin diseases to improve the skin: while on the one hand it increases the natural fluids in the skin, on the other it also removes excessive mucus from the skin.

The formula Jade Spring™ nourishes Stomach, Spleen and Lung-Yin and is a variation of Sha Shen Mai Dong Tang "Glehnia-Ophiopogon Decoction". The condition of Stomach-Yin deficiency is quite common in Western clinical practice and is caused by irregular diet over many years. In particular, it is due to eating late at night, eating in a hurry or on the run, discussing business while eating, skipping meals, going straight back to work after eating, etc. The tongue shows this condition very clearly, being dry, without coating (or with rootless coating) in the centre, and with a midline or scattered Stomach cracks. Please note that "Spring" in the name of this remedy refers to a water spring rather than the season of Spring.

Arouse Power™ tonifies the Kidneys and harmonizes the Heart. It is a new formula designed specifically to harmonize Heart and Kidneys for sexual problems.

Breaking Clouds™ is a variation of Bu Zhong Yi Qi Tang Tonifying the Centre and Benefitting Qi Decoction. While it tonifies and raises Qi, it is designed to raise mood in depression.

The remedy **Brocade Sinews™** nourishes Liver-Blood and benefits the sinews so that it can be used for musculoskeletal problems deriving from Liver-Blood deficiency.

The formula **Central Mansion™** is a variation of Shen Ling Bai Zhu San *Ginseng-Poria-Atractylodes Powder* that tonifies Qi and Yin of Stomach and Spleen and resolves Dampness.

Harmonize the Centre™ is another variation of Shen Ling Bai Zhu San Ginseng-Poria-Atractylodes Powder that tonifies Qi and Yin of Stomach and Spleen and resolves Dampness but it also invigorates Blood and can treat Type II diabetes.

Prosperous Earth™ is a variation of Liu Jun Zi Tang Six Gentlemen Decoction that tonifies Spleen-Qi.







Nourishing and Clearing

The formulae in the nourishing and clearing category are designed to address some of the most common conditions encountered in clinical practice. The overwhelming majority of cases present a complex condition in which the body's Qi is deficient and a pathogenic factor obstructs the normal functioning of Qi and Blood and the flow of Qi in the channels.

In the early stages of a pathology, the condition of the patient is usually characterized by fullness of a pathogenic factor. If this factor is not expelled, it will obstruct the proper movement and transformation of Qi, eventually leading to a deficiency. As the pathogenic factor is still retained, the condition is characterized by both Fullness (of a pathogenic factor) and Emptiness (of the body's Qi).

This often starts a vicious cycle whereby the pathogenic factor continues to obstruct the movement and transformation of Qi, thus leading to a deficiency of the body's Qi, while this in turn contributes to the accumulation of the pathogenic factor; for example, Dampness obstructs the Spleen and this induces a deficiency of Spleen-Qi, which then leads to the formation of more Dampness.

How should we choose when to tonify/nourish only and when to nourish and clear simultaneously? Apart from the symptoms, the pulse and tongue are important gauges as to when to tonify and when to nourish and clear at the same time. If the pulse is predominantly deficient (such as weak, empty, fine, choppy, or minute) and the tongue does not have a thick coating (or has no coating at all), then it is probably advisable to tonify. If the pulse is of the full type (e.g. full, wiry, slippery, overflowing, tight) and the tongue is swollen and has a thick coating, it is probably advisable to clear pathogenic factors.

If the pulse is of the deficient type (e.g. fine) but also has a quality which indicates the presence of a pathogenic factor (e.g. slippery), it is probably advisable to tonify the body's Qi and clear the pathogenic factors simultaneously. Similarly, if the tongue shows some deficiency (e.g. pale), but is swollen and has a thick coating, to tonify and clear at the same time is desirable.

From the point of view of Western medicine, many of these formulae address complex Full/Empty patterns appearing in conditions such as chronic fatigue syndrome, chronic arthritis and migraine:

Bend Bamboo™ is a formula created to nourish Liver-Blood and simultaneously to subdue Liver-Yang rising. The condition of deficient Liver-Blood leading to the rising of Liver-Yang (with resulting headaches, migraine, dizziness, etc.) is extremely common in practice (especially in women) and one which is not addressed by existing patent remedies.

Clear the Root™ is a formula aimed at treating chronic prostate problems such as prostatitis or prostatic hypertrophy. Its therapeutic aim is achieved by tonifying Qi, nourishing the Kidneys, draining Dampness, moving Blood, softening hardness, separating the clear from the turbid, and resolving Toxic Heat.







Freeing the Sun™ is a variation of the classic formula Dan Zhi Xiao Yao San Moutan-Gardenia Free and Easy Wanderer Powder which clears Liver-Heat deriving from Liver-Qi stagnation.

Invigorate the Root™ is a variation of the classic prescription Du Huo Ji Sheng Tang Angelica pubescens-Loranthus Decoction which tonifies Kidney-Yang and expels Wind-Dampness. *Invigorate the Root* treats chronic Bi syndrome from Kidney-Yang deficiency and Wind-Dampness in the joints.

Jade Screen™ is a formula specifically designed to treat the manifestations of allergic rhinitis. Although this formula contains the classical Yu Ping Feng San Jade Windscreen Powder, its main emphasis is not to tonify but to expel Wind and restore the diffusing of Lung-Qi to stop sneezing and nasal discharge. Apart from the herbs which expel Wind and target the nose, three herbs are included for their anti-allergy effect: Dan Shen Radix Salviae miltiorrhizae, Wu Wei Zi Fructus Schisandrae and Wu Mei Fructus Mume.

Nourish the Root and Clear Wind™ is another new formula created to address the common clinical situation of chronic retention of Wind and Dampness in the joints against a background of Kidney-Yin deficiency. The principle behind this formula is the same as that for *Brocade Sinews™* except that the condition addressed here is a deficiency of Kidney-Yin rather than Liver-Blood or Liver-Yin. This formula is especially suitable for chronic rheumatic problems in the elderly.

Smooth Passage™ is a new formula aimed at treating the so-called irritable bowel syndrome when it is caused by a disharmony of Spleen and Liver. Its main therapeutic aim is to tonify and move Qi and resolve Dampness in the Intestines.

Soothe the Centre™ is a variation of Xiang Sha Liu Jun Zi Tang Aucklandia-Amomum Six Gentlemen Decoction. The formula aims at dealing with one of the most common clinical conditions, i.e. deficiency of Spleen and Stomach Qi, some Stomach-Yin deficiency, retention of Dampness in the Middle Burner, and some stagnation of Qi.

Tonify Qi and Ease the Muscles™ is a variation of the ancient formula Bu Zhong Yi Qi Tang *Tonifying the Centre and Benefitting Qi Decoction*. This formula has been modified primarily to address the condition of Dampness that is seen so frequently in these cases.

Water Passages™ is a variation of the classic prescription Zhi Bai Di Huang Wan Anemarrhena-Phellodendron-Rehmannia Pill that nourishes Kidney-Yin and resolves Dampness from the Lower Burner. Water Passages treats chronic urinary infections occurring against as background of Kidney deficiency.







Clearing

The clearing formulae are used when the patient's condition is characterized primarily by the presence of a pathogenic factor. Even though there may be some deficiency, we may sometimes concentrate our attention on clearing pathogenic factors before tonifying the body's Qi; with herbal medicine (as opposed to acupuncture) this is often especially desirable.

Benefit the Sinews™ is a new remedy for chronic Bi syndrome with Dampness, Phlegm and Blood stasis.

Buddha's Hand™ is a formula that moves Qi in the Middle Burner, subdues rebellious Stomach-Qi and resolves Dampness.

Break into a Smile™ is a variation of the classic prescription Chai Hu Shu Gan Tang Bupleurum Soothing the Liver Decoction which moves Liver-Qi and eliminates stagnation.

Bright Spirit™ is a new remedy aimed at moving Qi and resolving Phlegm in the chest to alleviate emotional problems deriving from worry, sadness, grief or pensiveness.

Clear Channels™ is a new remedy for chronic Bi syndrome with Damp-Heat: this manifests with swelling, pain and redness of the small joints.

Clear Lustre™ is another new formula aimed at treating a wide range of skin problems. It cools Blood, resolves Dampness, expels Wind and clears Heat from the skin; the combination of these actions makes it suitable for different skin problems such as eczema, dermatitis, rosacea and acne.

Clear Qi™ is a variation of the classic prescription Su Zi Jiang Qi Tang Perilla Making Qi Descend Decoction to make Qi descend in chronic asthma.

Clear Yang™ is a variation of the classic prescription Ban Xia Bai Zhu Tian Ma Tang *Pinellia-Atractylodes-Gastrodia Decoction* which extinguishes Wind, resolves Phlegm and subdues Yang. *Clear Yang™* is aimed at treating chronic headaches and dizziness in the elderly deriving from a combination of Phlegm and Liver-Yang rising.

Drain Fields™ is a variation of Huo Po Xia Ling Tang Agastache-Magnolia-Pinellia-Poria Decoction which is used in exactly the same way as Ease the Muscles™, to which it may be preferred when there is Dampness without Heat.

Ease the Muscles™ is a well-tested variation of Lian Po Yin Coptis-Magnolia Decoction. This formula is extremely effective in eliminating Damp-Heat in chronic fatigue syndrome. It can be used in all cases when the condition is predominantly characterized by retention of Damp-Heat. The tiredness and exhaustion experienced by patients with chronic fatigue syndrome should not lead us to tonify automatically: if the tongue has a thick, sticky, yellow coating, the pulse is predominantly slippery and full, and the symptoms indicate pronounced retention of Damp-Heat (manifesting mainly as pronounced muscle ache), it is then safe to eliminate Damp-Heat before tonifying the body's Qi.







Ease the Muscles™ formula is ideally suited to do this, as it is aimed at resolving Dampness and clearing Heat from the muscles (muscle ache with feeling of heaviness), from the head (muzziness of the brain and impaired thinking) and from the Stomach and Spleen (epigastric fullness, nausea, thirst, sticky-bitter taste, poor appetite).

Expel Toxic Heat™ is a new remedy specifically aimed at treating Toxic Heat. Toxic Heat is a type of Heat that is particularly strong and it manifests with pain, swelling, redness and often pus. Swollen and purulent tonsils are an example of Toxic Heat and so are pustules.

Peaceful Sunset™ is a new formula aimed at clearing Liver-Fire, cooling and moving Blood, subduing Wind and resolving Phlegm-Heat. This remedy is specific for elderly people with symptoms of Liver-Fire, Blood Heat and stasis, internal Wind and Phlegm. This combination of factors is common in old people because there is a pathological interaction between Phlegm and stasis of Blood. Also, in old people, Phlegm-Heat is often associated with Liver-Fire and Liver-Wind, with the rising Fire and Wind carrying Phlegm with them. The tongue and pulse pictures of this condition are very typical: the tongue reddish-purple, swollen with a dry-sticky yellow coating, and the pulse full, slippery and wiry.

Red Stirring™ is a variation of the classic prescription Xue Fu Zhu Yu Tang Blood-Mansion Eliminating Stasis Decoction which moves Blood and eliminates stasis in the chest.

Separate Clear and Turbid™ is a variation of Bi Xie Fen Qing Yin Dioscorea Separating the Clear Decoction. Chronic "cystitis" is a very common occurrence in women. In very many cases, the main symptoms are frequent and urgent urination and discomfort which often occurs after micturition. Very often there is no pronounced burning on urination and urine culture does not show any bacterial infection. In most cases the urinary symptoms are due to deficient and sinking Spleen-Or and/or Kidney-Qi mimicking the symptoms of cystitis, although it is not true cystitis. This formula is a well-tested variation of Bi Xie Fen Qing Tang devised to address this situation.

Welcome Fragrance™ is a new formula which is aimed at treating chronic sinusitis, an extremely common condition in Western patients. The formula resolves Damp-Heat and Toxic Heat, expels Wind from the nose and sinuses and also tonifies Qi.







Calming the Mind

Calm the Shen™ is a variation of Gui Pi Tang *Tonifying the Spleen Decoction* which is used for anxiety and insomnia deriving from Blood deficiency.

Clear the SoulTM is a variation of Wen Dan Tang Warming the Gall-Bladder Decoction. This formula is aimed at treating emotional tension and anxiety occurring against a background of Phlegm obstructing the chest and therefore the Lungs and Heart. The key features of this formula, which has been proved to be clinically very effective, are emotional tension deriving from worry, grief or sadness affecting Lungs and Heart and causing a feeling of oppression of the chest, a swollen tongue with a stomach crack in the centre and a thick-sticky yellow coating, and a slippery pulse in the middle positions.

Nourish the SoulTM is a variation of the classic prescription Suan Zao Ren Tang Ziziphus Decoction that nourishes Liver- Yin and calms the Mind. Nourish the Soul treats anxiety and insomnia deriving from Liver-and Heart-Yin deficiency.

Open the Heart™ is a well-proven variation of Ban Xia Hou Po Tang Pinellia-Magnolia Decoction. It is aimed at dealing with emotional strain deriving from worry, frustration, or bottled-up anger, manifesting as a tightness of the chest or a feeling of obstruction in the throat. This formula is often cited as one to move Liver-Qi when, in fact, its clinical use is really to deal with stagnation of Qi in the chest deriving not so much from the Liver as from the Lungs and Heart.

Release Constraint™ is a variation of the classical prescription Yue Ju Wan *Ligusticum-Gardenia Pill. Release Constraint* is extremely effective in dealing with emotional strain and depression deriving from stagnation of Liver-Qi, especially in men.

Root the Spirit™ is a variation of the classic prescription Yin Mei Tang Attracting Sleep Decoction. It is aimed at treating mental restlessness, anxiety, vexation and insomnia deriving from a deficiency of Liver-Blood and/or Liver-Yin: this leads to the Hun being unrooted and the person feeling restless and aimless.

Searching Soul™ is a new formula that tonifies Qi, Yang and Blood and specifically Kidney-Yang and Liver-Blood in order to stimulate the "movement" of the Hun and relieve depression.

Settling the Soul™ is a variation of the classic prescription Long Dan Xie Gan Tang Gentiana Draining the Liver Decoction which drains Liver-Fire. This variation also resolves Phlegm and calms the Mind in situations of anxiety and insomnia.

Soothe the Shen™ is a new remedy that is a variation of the classic prescription Gan Mai Da Zao Tang *Glycyrrhiza-Triticum-Jujuba Decoction* which calms the Mind in conditions of Qi and/or Blood deficiency. I use it for depression and anxiety occurring against a background of Qi or Blood deficiency.







Releasing the Exterior

The formulae for releasing the Exterior are used only for acute invasions of Wind-Cold or Wind-Heat, i.e. common cold, earache, influenza, sore throat, etc.

Expel Wind-Heat™ is a variation of the classical prescription Yin Qiao San Lonicera-Forsythia Powder. This variation deals with the acute stage (Wei Level) of an invasion of Wind-Heat.

Expel Wind-Cold™ is a variation of the classical prescription Jing Fang Bai Du San Schizonepeta-Saposhnikovia Releasing the Exterior Decoction. This variation expels Wind-Cold and releases the Exterior; it deals in particular with the symptoms of runny nose, sneezing, stiff neck and shoulders, and headache.

Ringing Metal™ resolves Phlegm and clear Heat from the chest for situations of Phlegm-Heat deriving from an invasion of Wind.

Clear Metal™ resolves Phlegm, clears Heat and cools Blood for situations of Phlegm-Heat deriving from an invasion of Wind. Compared to the formula *Ringing Metal™* that is for the Qi Level of the 4 Levels, *Clear Metal™* can also treat the Ying Level.

Chemo-Support/Radio-Support

Chemo-Support™ is specifically aimed at treating the side-effects of chemotherapy by tonifying Qi, Blood and Yin and clearing Heat.

Radio-Support™ is aimed at treating the side-effects of radiotherapy by tonifying Qi and nourishing, moving and cooling Blood.







Three Treasures® Formulae with Classical Antecedents

The following is a list of the classical Chinese formulae in pinyin and English with the corresponding Three Treasures® formula.

As one can see, in some cases, there is more that one Three Treasures® formula for one Chinese formula. For example, there are two versions of the formula Bu Zhong Yi Qi Tang, i.e. Breaking Clouds™ for depression and Tonify Qi and Ease the Muscles™ for chronic fatigue syndrome.

Indications: Cough, asthma, wheezing, breathlessness, a feeling of oppression of the chest,

allergic asthma, seasonal allergic rhinitis with wheezing.

Tongue: Pale or normal-coloured.

Pulse: Weak.

Classical antecedent: Su Zi Jiang Qi Tang (Perilla-Seed Making Qi Descend Decoction).

Differences from classical antecedent: Stronger action in making Qi descend, anti-allergy action (for allergic asthma).

Cautions and contraindications: Contraindicated in pregnancy.

In a Nutshell: Prostate problems from Damp-Heat, Blood stasis, Toxic Heat against a background of Qi and Yin deficiency. Prostate benign or malignant hypertrophy, chronic prostatitis.

Patterns: Qi and Yin deficiency, Damp-Heat in the Lower Burner, Blood stasis, Toxic Heat.

Actions: Tonify Qi, nourish Kidney-Yin, drain Damp-Heat, move Blood, separate the clear from the turbid, soften hardness, resolve Toxic Heat.

Indications: Chronic prostatitis, prostatic hypertrophy (benign or malignant), difficult urination, frequent scanty urination, nocturia, weak-stream urination, feeling of distension in the hypogastrium or perineum, tiredness, poor memory, dizziness, tinnitus.

Tongue: Red (possibly without coating), sticky-yellow coating on the root with red spots.

Pulse: Fine-rapid or floating-empty; the left rear position might feel slippery on rolling the finger proximally (this is the prostate position).

Cautions and contraindications: The formula contains fairly strong invigorating Blood and resolving Toxic Heat herbs (although in a very small dose) so it should not be used continuously for more than a few months at a time. However, with breaks of about a month in between it may be used over a long period and in small doses (say, 1-2 tablets per day) it can also be used for the prevention of prostate problems in men over 50. Contraindicated in pregnancy.

Timing of administration: Take before meals.

In a Nutshell: Two main uses.

- 1 Calm the Mind, settle the Po, soothe the Lungs (sadness, worry, grief, anxiety).
- 2 Resolve Phlegm-Heat from the Lungs, residual Phlegm-Heat in Lungs.

Patterns: Phlegm-Heat obstructing the chest and Mind, Lung-Qi not descending.

Actions: Resolves Phlegm-Heat, calms the Mind, opens the Orifices, relaxes the chest.

Indications: Anxiety, a feeling of oppression of the chest and epigastrium, palpitations, a bitter-sticky taste, sighing, feeling uneasy, phlegm in the chest, poor digestion, slight nausea, insomnia, dream-disturbed sleep, dull complexion, mental restlessness, depression, jumpiness, a flustered feeling in the heart region, vomiting, dizziness, pre-menstrual tension.

Tongue: Red or normal, swollen, sticky-yellow coating, Stomach crack or Stomach-Heart crack with rough yellow coating inside it. A combined Heart and Stomach crack on the tongue extends all the way to the tip, as a Heart crack would do, but it is wide and shallow in the centre, as a Stomach crack would be.

Pulse: Slippery, rapid. The Heart pulse may feel relatively overflowing.

Classical antecedent: Wen Dan Tang (Warming the Gall-Bladder Decoction).

Differences from classical antecedent: Stronger action in calming the Mind and settling the Po.

In a Nutshell: Chronic headaches from Liver-Yang rising and Phlegm occurring against a background of Kidney deficiency. Also chronic dizziness from the same causes.

Actions: Subdue Liver-Yang, extinguish Liver-Wind, resolve Phlegm, nourish Blood, tonify Kidney-Yang, tonify Spleen-Qi.

Indications: Headaches which may be throbbing or dull in nature, dizziness, a feeling of heaviness and muzziness of the head which is worse in the morning, catarrh, a feeling of oppression of the chest, nausea, a sticky taste, blurred vision, vomiting during migraine attacks, tics, high blood pressure.

Tongue: Pale or normal-coloured, swollen, sticky-white coating.

Pulse: Weak and slightly slippery.

Classical antecedent: Ban Xia Bai Zhu Tian Ma Tang (Pinellia-Atractylodes-Gastrodia Decoction).

Differences from classical antecedent: It tonifies the Kidneys and nourishes Blood (original formula does not), it opens the Mind's orifices to resolve Phlegm from the brain.

Timing of administration: Take after meals.

Patterns: Dampness in the Centre and muscles, and Spleen-Qi deficiency.

Actions: Resolve Dampness, tonify Qi.

Indications: Feeling of oppression in the epigastrium, muzziness of the head, lack of concentration, poor memory, feeling of heaviness, tiredness, aching muscles, a sticky taste, nausea, poor appetite, loose stools.

Tongue: Sticky-white coating.

Pulse: Slippery and weak.

Classical antecedent: Huo Po Xia Ling Tang (Agastache-Magnolia-Pinellia-Poria Decoction).

Differences from classical antecedent: Stronger action in resolving Dampness from the space between skin and muscles with fragrant herbs (muscle ache), it mildly tonifies Qi (which original formula does not do).

NOTE: Although *Prosperous Earth* also treats Spleen-Qi deficiency and Dampness, *Drain Fields* should be used when the Dampness is primary to the Spleen deficiency and therefore the pulse is slippery and the tongue is swollen. If the Spleen deficiency is primary to the Dampness, then *Prosperous Earth* is appropriate.

Cautions and contraindications: Contraindicated in pregnancy.

In a Nutshell: Drain Liver- and Heart-Fire with bitter-cold herbs.

Patterns: Liver-Fire, Heart-Fire, Damp-Heat in Upper and Lower Burner.

Actions: Drain Liver-Fire, drain Heart-Fire, clear Heat, resolve Dampness, calm the Mind, settle the Ethereal Soul.

Indications: Headaches, irritability, propensity to outbursts of anger, red face, a bitter taste, tinnitus, dizziness, bloodshot eyes, thirst, constipation, dry stools, scanty-dark urine, nosebleeds, blood in urine or stools, a feeling of heat, anxiety, agitation, insomnia, dream-disturbed sleep, ear infection, tongue ulcers, cystitis with burning on micturition, urethritis, vaginitis, yellow vaginal discharge, heavy periods.

Tongue: Red with redder and swollen sides, red points on the sides and tip, yellow coating.

Pulse: Wiry and rapid.

Classical antecedent: Long Dan Xie Gan Tang (Gentiana Draining the Liver Decoction).

Differences from classical antecedent: Drain Heart-Fire and calm the Mind (which the original formula does not do), treat headaches.

Cautions and contraindications: This formula is for Fire and must therefore be used only when there are clear manifestations of Fire as indicated above. As long as the diagnosis of Liver-Fire is correct, there are no specific contraindications to the use of this formula. Obviously, this is not a tonifying formula and should therefore not be used for long periods of time. As it contains bitter cold herbs, long-term use of this formula may damage the Spleen. Therefore, if it is used on an ongoing basis it should be discontinued for 1 month every 4-5 months. Acupuncturists can pay attention to supporting the Spleen during the course of treatment with points such as Ren-12 Zhongwan, ST-36 Zusanli and BL-20 Pishu. Contraindicated in pregnancy.



Liver-Yang rising is an imbalance between Yin and Yang with rising rebellious Qi; not a true Shi condition. It is treated with herbs that subdue Qi (e.g. Mu Li, Shi Jue Ming, Zhen Zhu Mu) and herbs that extinguish Wind (e.g. Tian Ma, Gou Teng).

Liver-Fire is a totally Shi condition. Fire is drained by bitter-cold herbs which also move downwards (e.g. Da Huang, Huang Qin, Huang Lian, Huang Bo, Xia Ku Cao, Pu Gong Ying).

Symptoms: throbbing headache, dizziness, tinnitus, irritability, Wiry pulse.

Symptoms: thirst, agitation, red-burning eyes, bitter taste, nosebleed, dry stools, dark urine, Red tongue with yellow coating.

Liver-Heat and Liver-Fire share common characteristics. They both display a feeling of heat, thirst, red eyes, etc. Liver-Fire is characterized by a tongue that is deep-red and with a thick-dry-dark-yellow coating. Liver-Fire differs from Liver-Heat in four ways:

- 1 It is more intense (intense thirst, bitter taste).
- 2 It affects the Mind more (agitation, insomnia).
- 3 It may cause bleeding (vomiting of blood).
- 4 It dries more (dark urine and dry stools).

It is important to understand that *Drain Fire* is for Liver-Fire and Liver and Gall-Bladder Damp-Heat rather than Liver-Heat.

Indications: Tiredness, a feeling of heaviness, muzziness of the head, lack of concentration, poor memory, ache in the muscles, muscle fatigue, feeling of heat, a feeling of oppression of the epigastrium, a sticky taste or bitter taste, poor appetite, loose stools.

Tongue: Red or slightly red with a sticky-yellow coating. Even if the tongue is not red, the presence of a sticky-yellow coating is an essential sign for the prescription of this formula.

Pulse: Slippery, possibly only on the right side.

Classical antecedent: Lian Po Yin (Coptis-Magnolia Decoction).

Differences from classical antecedent: Stronger action in eliminating Dampness from the space between the skin and muscles (muscle ache), mildly tonify Qi (only one herb).

NOTE: Ease the Muscles resolves Damp-Heat, Drain Fields resolves Dampness.

Cautions and contraindications: Contraindicated in pregnancy.

Cautions and contraindications: This formula is only for acute invasions of Wind-Heat at the initial stage when the Wind-Heat is on the Exterior. It is therefore contraindicated for any condition that is not exterior and not caused by Wind-Heat. It is usually used for only a few days. After this time, either the Wind-Heat will have been expelled completely and require no further treatment, or it will have progressed into the Interior, changing into interior Heat, in which case a different formula is needed.

Timing of administration: Take after meals.









Differences from classical antecedent: Tonifies Kidney-Yang.

Tongue: Red without coating or with rootless coating. It may be red only in the centre or front part. It may also be only slightly red with a rootless coating.

Pulse: Floating-empty or fine.

NOTE: This formula is for people either with a Yin deficiency or a constitutional tendency to Yin deficiency. The tongue could range from one with normal colour and a rootless coating to one that is red and completely without coating. If the tongue is pale, use *Herbal Sentinel – Yang*. If the tongue is normal and the patient has symptoms of constitutional Yin deficiency, use *Herbal Sentinel – Yin*.

In a Nutshell: Chronic Bi Syndrome from Wind and Dampness in the channels occurring against a background of Kidney-Yang deficiency, Spleen-Qi deficiency and Blood deficiency.

Patterns: Wind-Dampness in the channels, Spleen-Qi deficiency, Blood deficiency, Kidney-Yang deficiency.

Actions: Expel Wind and resolve Dampness from the channels, tonify Kidney-Yang, tonify Spleen-Qi, nourish Blood.

Indications: This remedy is for Chronic Painful Obstruction Syndrome (Bi) from Wind and Dampness in the channels occurring against a background of Kidney-Yang deficiency, Spleen-Qi deficien cy and Blood deficiency. The main symptoms and signs are chronic backache that is aggravated by exposure to cold and dampness and alleviated by the application of heat, pain in the joints with no swelling or slight swelling, knee-ache, dizziness, tinnitus, tiredness, feeling cold, frequent urination, pale urine, lack of will-power, a feeling of cold in the back and knees, weak knees, blurred vision, tingling of limbs, constipation, poor digestion.

Tongue: Pale.

Pulse: Deep, weak.

Classical antecedent: Du Huo Ji Sheng Tang (Angelica pubescentis-Loranthus Decoction).

Differences from classical antecedent: Tonify Spleen-Qi, nourish Blood, balance the tonification of Yang with a Yin tonic.

Cautions and contraindications: Contraindicated in pregnancy.

In a Nutshell: Allergic rhinitis. It treats only the manifestations of allergic rhinitis, not its cause. (Herbal Sentinel treats the cause of allergic rhinitis).

Patterns: Wind impairing the descending and diffusing of Lung-Qi in the nose.

Actions: Expel Wind, tonify Qi, strengthen Defensive-Qi, anti-allergy.

Indications: Allergic rhinitis, sneezing, runny nose with a clear-watery discharge, itchy eyes and nose, dull soreness on the forehead, blocked nose, hay fever, allergy to cats, dogs, horses, dust mites, dust, etc., chronic sinusitis (only when secondary to rhinitis).

No specific tongue or pulse are associated with Jade Screen as it is used for the symptoms (biao) of allergic rhinitis, irrespective of the tongue or pulse.

Cautions and contraindications: This formula contains some pungent herbs which may damage Yin and some bitter herbs that may weaken the Spleen if used over a long period of time. It should not therefore be used for longer than a few months at a stretch. Alternatively, if it is prescribed in conjunction with acupuncture treatment attention could be paid to tonifying the Spleen and nourishing Yin with acupuncture.

Timing of administration: Take after meals.

Tongue: Dry, either no coating or rootless coating in the centre, Stomach crack in the midline or scattered small cracks; it may be slightly red in the centre.

Pulse: Floating-empty on the right middle position.

Classical antecedent: Sha Shen Mai Dong Tang (Glehnia-Ophiopogon Decoction).

Differences from classical antecedent: Nourishes Spleen-Yin.

Cautions and contraindications: Yin tonics tend to be "sticky" and may injure the Spleen but this would happen only after long-term use (several months). If using acupuncture attention can be given to supporting the Spleen.











Patterns: Phlegm (Damp, Cold or Hot) in the Middle and Upper Burner.

Actions: Dry Dampness and resolve Phlegm.

Indications: Cough with abundant sputum, catarrh in the chest, nose or throat, white or yellow sputum, a feeling of oppression of the chest, nausea, vomiting, palpitations, dizziness, insomnia, lipomas.

Tongue: Pale, swollen with a sticky-white coating in case of Damp or Cold Phlegm, or red, swollen with a sticky-yellow coating in case of Hot Phlegm.

Pulse: Slippery and slow in case of Cold Phlegm, or slippery and rapid in case of Hot Phlegm.

Classical antecedent: Er Chen Tang (Two Old Decoction).

Differences from classical antecedent: Resolves Phlegm-Heat and Cold Phlegm.

Cautions and contraindications: This formula is drying and should not be used if the patient suffers from even mild Yin deficiency. Since this formula treats only the Manifestation of Phlegm it is not suitable for long-term administration (more than a few months), and should be followed by the administration of a formula that tonifies the Spleen, such as Soothe the Centre™ to treat the Root. Alternatively, these two formulae may be used together. Acupuncturists could use this formula to treat the Manifestation of Phlegm and acupuncture to treat the Root by tonifying the Spleen with points such as ST-36 Zusanli, SP-3 Taibai, BL-20 Pishu and BL 21 Weishu.

In a Nutshell: Nourish Kidney-Yin. **Patterns:** Kidney-Yin deficiency.

Actions: Nourish Kidney-Yin and Jing, strengthen the will-power.

Indications: Dizziness, tinnitus, sore back and legs, night-sweating, dry mouth and throat in the evening, feeling of heat and vague anxiety in the evening, 5-palm heat (a feeling of heat in palms, chest and soles), thirst with desire to drink in small sips, exhaustion, depression, dry stools, lower backache, infertility, insomnia (waking up during the night), blurred vision, dry skin and hair, dryness of the vagina, dry eyes, thin body, scanty-dark urine.

Tongue: This could range from a nearly normal-coloured body (tending to red) with rootless coating to a red body without any coating at all, depending on the degree of Yin deficiency and Empty Heat. The less the coating, the deeper the Yin deficiency, and the redder the tongue body, the stronger the Empty Heat.

Pulse: Floating-empty, or weak on both rear positions and relatively overflowing on both front ones, or fine and rapid if there is pronounced Empty Heat.

Classical antecedent: Zuo Gui Wan (Restoring the Left [Kidney] Pill).

Differences from classical antecedent: Stronger moistening action. Rootless coating (mildest Yin Xu).

Cautions and contraindications: Yin-nourishing substances are cloying in nature and tend to weaken the Spleen and increase Dampness. If there is a Spleen deficiency and some Dampness together with the Kidney-Yin deficiency (which is quite common), do not use the formula continuously: take it for 3-4 months and then suspend its use for 1-2 months. Alternatively, if the patient is receiving acupuncture, the practitioner could treat the Kidney-Yin deficiency with this formula and concentrate on tonifying the Spleen and resolving Dampness with acupuncture.

Timing of administration: Take in the evening (or a higher dose in the evening), ideally with a little, slightly-salted, hot water.



Patterns: Damp-Heat in the Bladder, Kidney deficiency, sinking of Qi.

Indications: Frequency of urination, difficult urination, urgency of urination, burning on urination, hypogastric pain, backache, dizziness, tinnitus, tiredness, feeling of bearing down.

If it is used in conjunction with acupuncture treatment, this can be aimed at tonifying the Lungs and Spleen in order to treat the Root.

Differences from Classical Antecedent: Stronger action in clearing Empty Heat.

Cautions and contraindications: This formula contains many Yin tonics which are cloying in nature and their long-term use may injure the Spleen. Thus, their use should be discontinued every few months. Alternatively, acupuncturists should pay attention to supporting the Spleen while this formula is administered.





Integration of Herbal Medicine with Acupuncture

For those who practise acupuncture the integration of this treatment modality with herbal formulae can broaden the scope of the therapeutic range and allow for greater flexibility. The first thing that should be stressed is that, whilst in a few cases a herbal formula fits the patient's disharmony well and can therefore address the whole condition, in most cases of chronic diseases, it is unrealistic to expect a herbal formula to address the whole constellation of patterns of disharmony.

The condition of most patients with chronic diseases will manifest with at least two patterns, and often more. For example, it would not be unusual for a patient to suffer from Liver-Blood deficiency, Liver-Qi stagnation, Liver-Yang rising, Spleen-Qi deficiency and Dampness in the Middle Burner. Although two or even three formulae can be used in combination, it is sometimes preferable to integrate acupuncture with a herbal remedy. One can therefore use a herbal formula to address a certain pattern of disharmony and acupuncture to treat another.

The integration of acupuncture with herbal formulae is advantageous because it allows us to use one formula only and also because it simplifies the acupuncture protocol. Furthermore, the integration of acupuncture and herbal remedies works particularly well if we are clear about the diagnosis, the differentiation between Root (Ben) and Manifestation (Biao) and the treatment principle.

Root (Ben) and Manifestation (Biao)

The Root is the disharmony that is the origin of the patient's symptoms and signs. The Manifestation is the complex of symptoms and signs stemming from the Root: the relationship between Root and Manifestation is very much like that between the root of a tree and its branches: the condition of the root (and the soil) determines the appearance of the branches. Treating the root of a tree improves the health of its branches: similarly, treating the Root of a disharmony automatically treats its Manifestation.

For example, if a patient suffers from shivers, acute occipital headache, a slight temperature, a stiff neck, a runny nose, sneezing and a Floating pulse, the Root is invasion of the Lung's Wei-Qi portion by Wind-Cold and all the symptoms are the Manifestation. It is not necessary to treat each individual symptom as treating the Root, i.e. expelling Wind-Cold and releasing the Exterior, will lead to the disappearance of the Manifestation.

If we are clear about the Root and Manifestation and the treatment principle to be adopted, we can then use acupuncture to treat the Root and a herbal remedy to treat the Manifestation or vice versa. For example, if a patient suffers from oedema of the ankles, with frequent-pale urination, backache, chilliness, a pale tongue and a deepweak pulse, the oedema is the Manifestation and Kidney-Yang deficiency is the Root.

If we are clear as to what is the Root and what is the Manifestation among the various clinical manifestations, we could use *Strengthen the Root* to treat the Root, i.e. tonify







Kidney-Yang, and acupuncture to resolve oedema (with Ren-9 Shuifen, Ren-5 Shimen, SP-9 Yinlingquan, KI-7 Fuliu and BL-22 Sanjiaoshu). The opposite approach could also be taken, tonifying Kidney-Yang with acupuncture (with KI-7 Fuliu, KI-3 Taixi, BL-23 Shenshu, with moxa), and resolving oedema with a herbal remedy which may be Wu Ling San Five "Ling" Powder or the Three Treasures® remedy Separate Clear and Turbid.

Expelling pathogenic factors versus tonifying the body's Qi

The Full and Empty character of the condition is also important and we can use acupuncture to deal with the Full condition (expelling pathogenic factors) and a herbal formula to tonify the body Qi or vice versa.

When I use herbal medicine only in a complex Full-Empty condition, I usually prefer to deal with the Fullness and Emptiness separately and I often start by expelling pathogenic factors first. For example, in a case of Chronic Fatigue Syndrome with deficiency of Spleen-Qi and pronounced Dampness, I would most probably start with a formula that drains Dampness such as *Drain Fields* and I would not give a tonic formula: this approach is especially recommended ended if the tongue and pulse indicate a Full condition: in the example above, the tongue would be swollen and with a sticky coating and the pulse would be full and slippery.

I prefer this approach, i.e. expelling pathogenic factors first, because I feel that herbal tonics cannot work well when the body is encumbered by pathogenic factors, especially if these are Dampness or Phlegm. Obviously, the formula that expels pathogenic factors should be followed eventually by one that tonifies the body's Qi, in the above example *Tonify Qi and Ease the Muscles* to tonify Spleen-Qi.

Acupuncture works in a different way from herbal medicine as it does not introduce any substance in the body and has a more self-regulating and self-balancing effect: for example, if we needle Ren-12 Zhongwan, this will tonify the Spleen and resolve Dampness, whereas if we use Huang Lian *Rhizoma Coptidis* this will only dry Dampness and not tonify the Spleen. Indeed, if we used it for a long time, its bitter-cold energy might injure the Spleen.

Thus, because of this self-balancing character of acupuncture, we can often use a herbal formula to expel pathogenic factors and acupuncture to tonify the body's Qi. For example, if a patient suffers from stasis of Blood deriving from internal Cold and Yang deficiency, we could use *Stir Field of Elixir* to invigorate Blood and eliminate stasis and acupuncture to tonify Kidney-Yang and expel Cold (with Ren-6 Qihai, Kl-3 Taixi, BL-23 Shenshu, with moxa); alternatively, we could use acupuncture to invigorate Blood (with SP-IO Xuehai, BL-17 Geshu and ST-29 Guilai) and the formula *Strengthen the Root* to tonify and warm Kidney-Yang.

Local problems

The use of a herbal formula often "frees" the acupuncture which can become simpler and more focused on a specific problem. For example, if a patient suffers from eczema that is very localized in a specific area, e.g. around the scalp, we can use a formula







such as *Clear Lustre* to cool Blood in general; by doing this, the acupuncture is freed from the necessity of clearing Heat and cooling Blood in general and can be more focused on the specific area affected with the use of local points. This also allows us to reduce the number of points used.

Another example could be that of a patient with eye problems deriving from Liver-Blood deficiency. By using a formula to nourish Blood such as *Brighten the Eyes*, the acupuncture can be focused on treating the local points around the eyes. Yet another example could be that of a patient suffering from Bi Syndrome of one joint only, occurring against a background of Liver-Blood deficiency; in such a case we could prescribe *Brocade Sinews* to nourish Liver-Blood and expel Wind-Damp and use acupuncture simply to treat the affected joint.

Acupuncture to counteract possible side-effects

This is an important use of acupuncture in conjunction with herbal formulae. If we need to use a herbal formula that might have undesirable side-effects, we can use acupuncture to counteract them. For example, if a patient suffers from pronounced Yin deficiency we would prescribe *Nourish the Root*: a pronounced Yin deficiency will necessarily take a long time to treat and if the patient also suffers from a Spleen deficiency (which is very likely) the cloying effect of the Yin tonics may injure the Spleen in the long run.

Thus, an acupuncturist can dedicate his or her attention to supporting the Spleen (with Ren-12 Zhongwan, ST-36 Zusanli and SP-6 Sanyinjiao) while the patient is taking the Yin tonic. Another example could be that of a patient needing a formula to tonify and warm Yang (such as *Strengthen the Root*): hot herbs may damage Yin when used for a long time. An acupuncturist can therefore use acupuncture to support the Yin, by tonifying Ren-4 Guanyuan, KI-6 Zhaohai and KI-3 Taixi.





Dosage of Herbal Remedies

The question of dosage is a very complex one for which there are no hard and fast rules. In many cases, it is a matter of trial and error; patients often find their own "correct" level of dosage.

Many factors influence dosage, and I am going to discuss them one by one: it should be stressed that all the following factors need to be taken into account in every case. As a very general guideline, the dosage for the Three Treasures® and Women's Treasure® remedies is 1-3 tablets, 2-3 times a day, i.e. from 2 to 9 tablets a day. However, this dosage can be exceeded and, in a few cases, an even lower dose may be applicable.

The Full or Empty Character of the Condition

In Empty patterns the dosage can be lower than in Full patterns. Thus, for all the formulae that expel pathogenic factors, the dosage should be higher than for those that tonify the body's Qi. For example, if we are prescribing *Stir Field of Elixir* for abdominal pain from stasis of Blood with some abdominal masses (such as small fibroids), one might use 6 tablets a day or more. Vice versa, if one were treating a deficiency condition with *Brighten the Eyes*, then 2-3 tablets a day might be enough.

Chronic vs Acute Conditions

The distinction between chronic and acute conditions is an important one. In acute cases, the dosage should be higher. For example, if we are using Expel Wind-Heat for a severe invasion of Wind-Heat with fever, swollen tonsils, pronounced aches, etc., then the patient can take 12 or even more tablets in 24 hours. In contrast, there is no point in treating a chronic condition with a high dose, because it can change only slowly. Please note that some formulae used for chronic cases can be adapted to treat acute cases. For example, Bend Bamboo (for chronic headaches from Liver-Yang rising) can be used to treat acute migraine attacks by increasing the dosage substantially, i.e. 6-9 or even more a day.

Age of the Patient

Old people and children need lower doses. A newborn baby should not be treated at all and it is preferable not to treat any baby under 6 months of age unless absolutely imperative. Infants and children up to 6 years old should have a third of a dose; children between 6 and 14 half a dose; after that, a full dose. With drugs, the dosage for children is now adjusted according to body surface rather than body weight.

As indicated above, babies under 6 months of age should not be treated at all and the above values are given only for reference.







A simple formula to calculate the dosage for children is as follows:

$$\frac{\text{Age x Dose}}{\text{Age + 12}}$$

For example, if an adult dose is 6 grams per day, the dosage for a 6-year-old would be:

$$\frac{6 \times 6}{6 + 12} = 2 \text{ grams}$$

The dosage should also be reduced in the elderly: approximately half a dose after 70 and a third of a dose after 80.

Condition and body-build of the Patient

The weaker the patient, the lower the dose. Thus, a frail old lady should have a lower dose than a large, corpulent man.

The condition itself

The dosage should be adjusted also according to the severity of symptoms. For example, the dosage of Chemo- and Radio-Support should be varied according to the severity of the adverse reactions to chemo- or radiotherapy. For example, an average dose for these remedies might be about 4-6 tablets a day, but if the adverse reactions to the therapy are severe this dosage can be increased.

The digestive system

The weaker the patient's digestive system, the lower the dose. This is a very important consideration: Western patients have weaker digestive systems than Chinese people and are easily upset by herbal tablets (more than by decoctions). If a patient experiences a digestive upset, make sure that he or she is taking the tablets after food and with hot water.

Pregnancy

It is prudent not to prescribe any formulae during the first three months of pregnancy. From the fourth month onwards, formulae can be prescribed, unless, of course, they are specifically forbidden in pregnancy. These are indicated on the next page. When prescribing formulae to women of child-bearing age, it is advisable to ask them whether they are actively trying to conceive: if they are, be sure not to prescribe one of the formulae that are contraindicated in pregnancy, lest the woman take the formulae during the first few weeks of pregnancy before she knows she is pregnant.

In conclusion: my advice is always to start with a relatively low dose (except, of course, in very clear-cut, acute, Full conditions), as the dose can always be increased, whereas the patient who has a poor reaction may give up the treatment altogether.







Some of the formulae produce best results if taken at specific times:

- Strengthen the Root and Ease the Journey-Yang: take a higher dose in the morning
- Nourish the Root and Ease the Journey-Yin: take a higher dose in the evening, and to maximize the effect take it with very slightly salted water
- Soothe the Centre: take half an hour before a meal
- Brocade Sinews: take a higher dose half an hour before breakfast
- Clear the Soul and Root the Spirit: take a higher dose in the evening
- Expel Wind-Heat and Expel Wind-Cold: take after meals, preferably with hot ginger water
- Separate Clear and Turbid: take before meals

If two or three different formulae are combined, it is advisable to reduce their individual dosage accordingly and take them at different times. I generally do not use more than three remedies at a time. For example, if one combines Ease the Journey – Yin with Ease the Journey – Yang, the former is best taken in the evening and the latter in the morning. In such cases, the dosage should be adjusted according to the therapeutic aim: for example, if deficiency of Yin predominates, the dosage of Ease the Journey – Yin should be double that of Ease the Journey – Yang.

Another example could be the combination of *Brighten the Eyes* to nourish Liver-Blood and *Freeing the Moon* to move Qi and pacify the Liver in premenstrual tension. If deficiency of Liver-Blood predominates, the dosage of *Brighten the Eyes* should be double that of *Freeing the Moon*, and vice versa if stagnation of Liver-Qi predominates. As for the time of administration, *Brighten the Eyes* could be taken in the morning and *Freeing the Moon* in the afternoon.

Finally, a word of warning about liver disease. If a patient is known to be infected with the hepatitis virus (A, B or C), particular care should be exercised by using a lower dosage than normal. In such cases, it is strongly advisable to ask the patient to undergo a liver-function test prior to starting herbal therapy so that herbs are not wrongly blamed for affecting the liver function negatively.

The tablets should generally be taken at least 1 hour before or after a meal preferably with hot water and definitely not with tea, coffee or fruit juices. They should not be taken at or within an hour of a meal because absorption of a compound may be reduced if it combines with a food molecule. If possible, the tablets should not be taken after 8-9 pm. It is preferable if the tablets are chewed before being swallowed: however, if the patient finds them distasteful, it is acceptable to swallow them. It is particularly desirable to chew the tablets that treat problems in the head such as Welcome Fragrance, Jade Screen, Brighten the Eyes, Bend Bamboo, Expel Wind-Heat and Expel Wind-Cold.

Tablets should not be taken at the same time as Western drugs: at least 1 hour should elapse between the two.








Herbal remedies versus drugs

Even for drugs, the question of dosage is far from being as scientific and accurate as we are led to believe. Reactions to a drug vary enormously and unpredictably between individuals as plasma concentrations commonly vary by a factor of 5 or more.

Since herbal remedies are safer than drugs, the therapeutic range is far broader than that of drugs. Indeed, the harmful dosage of herbs is so high that it would be impossible to ingest in one day. There are, in fact, reports of adverse reactions to herbal remedies in people who used them (unsuccessfully) in suicide attempts.




Figure 5. Therapeutic range of herbal remedies (left) and drugs (right). Reproduced with permission from the British Medical Association "A Guide to Medicines and Drugs", Dorling Kindersley, London, 1991.

The difference between the therapeutic range of drugs and herbal remedies can be illustrated in a diagram; Figure 5 shows herbal remedies on the left, drugs on the right.

Of course, there are toxic plants for which the dosage is crucial and the therapeutic range quite narrow (e.g. Lei Gong Teng Radix Tripterigii wilfordii, Huang Yao Zi Semen Dioscoreae bulbiferae, Ma Qian Zi Semen Strychni etc.) but the Three Treasures® and Women's Treasures® ranges do not contain any of these toxic herbs.

Children are not just a 'small version⁷ of adults. Children have specific characteristics which influence the aetiology and pathology of their life. In order to treat children successfully, it is very important to master the main characteristics of children's physiology and pathology.

There are eight chief characteristics of children. These are:

- Spleen often deficient
- b Yin often deficient

- f The Zangfu are 'clear' and 'with vitality', they recover easily

I shall therefore discuss these characteristics one by one.

a The Spleen is often deficient

This is a very important and common characteristic of children. All children are born with an immature digestive system which strengthens gradually over the course of their life. It is for this reason that children need to be fed purely milk in the first few months of life as milk is rich in nourishment and easy to digest. Even so, small babies have trouble coping even with just milk: as all who have children know, small babies' life revolves all around their digestive system. They get hungry and cry, they are fed and feel satisfied and then need to burp to let milk go down; they often regurgitate some milk that they cannot digest. Erequently in the course of breastfeeding they suck in air and get colic.

When treating a baby or child, we can therefore assume that the Spleen is weak and we can add herbs to tonify the Spleen to whatever formula we are using. The main herb would be Bai Zhu *Rhizoma Atractylodis macrocephalae*. Similarly, when giving an acupuncture treatment to a baby or child, I would nearly always use Ren-12 Zhongwan to tonify the Stomach and Spleen.

As a result of the Spleen's weakness, babies and children are very prone to Eood Retention (or Accumulation). As the Spleen fails to transform and transport food essence properly, food accumulates in the Stomach causing bad digestion, feeling of fullness, sour regurgitation, belching. Again, when treating children, the younger they are, the more important it is to treat Eood Retention with herbs that dissolve it, e.g. Shan Zha Fructus Crataegi, Shen Qu Massa







medicata feimentata, Gu Ya Fructus Oryzae gaminatus, Mai Ya Fructus Hordei gaminatus or Lai Eu Zi Semen Raphani.

b Yin is often deficient

Children suffer easily from Yin deficiency. However, the Yin deficiency children suffer from has a quite different aetiology than that in adults. In adults, Yin deficiency usually results from years of overwork and irregular diet. In children, Yin deficiency is either constitutional or it results from the burning of Yin by Heat in the course of a febrile disease. In this latter context, children can develop Yin deficiency in a matter of days.

c The Zangfu are vulnerable

"Vulnerability" of the Zangfu means that the internal organs of children are more delicate than those of adults. Tor this reason, for example, children are prone to coughs after invasions of external Wind: that is because the Lungs are "tender" and delicate and are easily affected by Heat and Phlegm.

Another example of "vulnerability" of the Zangfu is the Liver. Children are very prone to Liver disharmonies which may be Liver-Qi stagnation in digestive problems, Liver-Yang rising or Liver-Pire in irritability and insomnia, or Liver-Wind when they get convulsions in the course of a febrile disease.

d Qi is easily deviated from its pathways

Connected to the vulnerability of the internal organs referred to above, children's Qi pathways are easily deranged. What does this mean? It means that, in children, the "Qi Mechanism" is easily upset. The Qi Mechanism consists in the coordinated ascending, descending, entering and exiting of Qi in every organ and every part of the body.

It is for this reason, that children and babies so easily suffer from vomiting and regurgitation of food. Tor example, external invasion of Wind frequently upset the Qi pathways and the baby or child vomits: this does not usually happen in adults. This situation is so common that, in children, vomiting during invasions of external Wind should not necessarily be interpreted as a manifestation of the invasion of Wind in the Stomach.

e Children fall ill easily and recover easily, pathological changes are rapid

Although the Zangfu of children are vulnerable (which means that children fall ill easily), they do recover more easily than those of adults. This is a very important trait in treatment as children react much more readily to treatment than adults do. This means that Chinese medicine can truly benefit children as it can treat childhood illness such as asthma, thus effectively preventing years of morbidity and medication use.

Another characteristic of children is that, in the course of an illness, pathological changes occur rapidly. Tor example, during the course of an infection, a child can go from the Wei to the Blood Level in a matter of days; also, during the







course of a febrile disease, children may develop Yin deficiency in a matter of days (and they can recover equally rapidly).

f The Zangfu are 'clear' and 'with vitality', they recover easily

This point is related to the previous one. Although children's Zangfu are delicate, compared to those of adults, they are also "clear". This is due to the fact that they are not encumbered by years of pathology. Tor example, Phlegm in an adult is the result of a complex pathological process that is difficult to treat. In adults, Phlegm often encumbers the Lungs and is the cause of further pathology. This does not happen in children in whom the Zangfu are "clear". The "clarity" of the Zangfu is another reason why children usually react to treatment promptly.

g The Liver is often diseased

In children, a pathology of the Liver is common. However, this is in a different sense than in adults. In adults, Liver-Qi stagnation is a common pathology deriving usually from repressed anger. Children however, do not repress their emotions in the same way as adults do and Liver-Qi stagnation from repressed emotions is not common. However, that is not to say that Liver-Qi stagnation does not occur in children: it does and it derives more from a derangement of the Stomach and Spleen and Accumulation of Pood rather from the suppression of emotions as it happens in adults. Thus, the saying "the Liver is often diseased" refers more to the pathology of Liver-Wind that can develop relatively easily at the Blood level following an infection. Another Liver pathology children do suffer from is Liver-Pire which usually occurs in children who pertain to the Pire element constitutionally and who are also subject to stressful family situations.

h Children are prone to Heat

This is an important and common characteristic of children. Compared to adults, they are more prone to Heat than to Cold. For example, teething in babies always manifests with symptoms of Heat (hence the red cheeks).

When invaded by exterior Wind, children suffer much more frequently from Wind-Heat than from Wind-Cold. When suffering from a residual pathogenic factor this is usually always Heat, Damp-Heat or Phlegm-Heat.

i Children's Shen is relatively immature

Although the Shen is formed at conception, at this time, it is an immature type of Shen which then matures over the following 6-7 years (see below). It is because of the immaturity of the Shen and resulting emotional lability that small children cry easily at the slightest incident and they also laugh easily. For example, we are all familiar with the situation when a toddler cries loudly because he or she fell and scraped his or her knee but they are easily distracted and we can make them laugh by doing something funny with their favourite teddy bear.

The immaturity of the *Shen* in children is *not* a pathology and it does not usually need any treatment. Indeed, the emotional lability of children is an asset as it means that children do not repress and hide their emotions as adults do.







2 Constitutional Types

There are two different classifications of children's constitutional types. I shall describe below the Five Elements constitutional types of children first. Constitutional types are useful to determine the prognosis and treatment of a child. The Element type of a child is particularly important when giving a preventive treatment.

a Five Elements Types

i Wood

Myopia from early age, headaches from early age, very tense child, sinewy body, Wiry pulse, enuresis (from Liver-Fire), restless sleep, twitching in sleep, screaming in sleep, hungry.

ii Fire

Bluish tinge forehead (Fig. 6), fearful, restless sleep, crying at night, Heart crack on tongue (Fig. 7), tense child, body hot, red eyes, red cheeks (or opposite, cold hands, pale complexion). Tongue has red tip.

iii Earth

Flaccid muscles alongside the spine, digestive problems, vomiting, diarrhoea, sallow complexion, quiet child, thin body or fat body (if has Phlegm) when new-born, gets thinner after one month.

iv Metal

White complexion, fearful, shy, prone to colds, whooping cough, asthma-eczema, thin chest, 'special Lung pulse', Lung crack on tongue (Fig.8). The special 'Lung pulse runs' medially from the Lung position towards the thumb (Fig.9).

v Water

Nocturnal enuresis (from Kidney deficiency), child without energy, lassitude, no drive, thin body, may

be developing slowly, asthma- eczema, headaches from early age, frequent urination, feeling cold.

b Other Constitutional Types 1

i Dry, hot, thin

Thin body, dry skin, withered hair, dry mouth and nose, red, swollen throat, mouth or tongue ulcers, thirst, night sweating, hot palms, easy to get abscesses or carbuncles, four limbs contracted, scanty urine, dry stools, tongue Red, yellow coating or not enough coating.

Should have sweet-cool foods and herbs.

ii Xu-cold, thin, weak

Thin body, thin limbs, cold hands and feet, dull-pale complexion, feeling cold, vomiting, diarrhoea, abdominal pain, pale urine, loose stools, crying easily, lazy, sweating easily, breathlessness, tongue Pale, pulse Deep, Fine.

Should have warm and sweet foods and herbs.

iii Greasy, overweight, sluggish

Pat body, swollen under eyes, distended abdomen, greasy skin, skin spots, swollen face, poor digestion, loose stools, tongue Pale and Swollen, pulse Slippery.

Should have warm, drying foods and herbs.

iv Oedema, dark complexion

Oedema body or face, dark under eyes, dark- withered skin, withered hair, weak muscles and tendons, slow speech, mental retardation, incontinence or urine, Tongue Red and Swollen with yellow-sticky coating, pulse Pine.

Must tonify and invigorate Blood, benefit the Kidneys and support Yang.

v Weary, wasting, slack, soft

Thin body, weak limbs, no strength, yellow-sallow complexion, no strength in neck, flaccid muscles, weariness, slow speech, eyes without *shen*, feeling cold, loose stools, crying, abdominal distension. Tonify the Spleen and Kidneys.

3 The Stages of Childhood According to Po, Zhi, Hun, Shen and Yi

The following is a classification of the stages of childhood that is not traditional but my own according to my clinical experience. According to this view, each stage of childhood is characterized by one of the 'Pive Zhi', i.e. the Po (Corporeal Soul), Zhi (Will-Power or Memory), Hun (Ethereal Soul), Shen (Mind) and Yi (Intellect).

Of course, all of these mental-spiritual aspects of the Organs are present at the same time in every human being in all stages of life.

However, they do not all mature at the same time. For example, at conception, there is only *Po* and *Shen*.







The Essence (Jing) is the origin and biological basis of the Shen. The 'Spiritual Axis' says in chapter 8: "Life comes about through the Essence; when the two Essences (of mother and father) unite, they form the Shen." ² Zhang Jie Bin says: "The two Essences, one Yin, one Yang, unite to form life; the Essences of mother and father unite to form the Shen." ³

Thus, the Pre-natal Essences of the mother and father combine to produce the *Shen* of a newly-conceived being. Thus, from the Chinese point of view, the *Shen*, albeit an immature type, is formed at conception. After birth, its Pre-natal Essence is stored in the Kidneys and it provides the biological foundation for the *Shen*. The life and *Shen* of a newly-born baby, however, also depend on the nourishment from its own Postnatal Essence.

The Po is also formed at conception, in theory three days after conception resonating with the 3rd day of the waxing moon. The Po derives from the mother, while the Hun derives from the father. The Po is closely bound to the Jing (Essence) of the Kidneys: it is usually described as the 'entering and exiting of Jing'.

Being the closest to Jing, the Po is responsible for the first physiological processes after birth. Zhang Jie Bin says: "In the beginning of life ears, eyes and Heart perceive, hands and feet move and breathing starts: all this is due to the sharpness of the Po." ⁴

It is said that in the first month of life especially, the baby is 'all Po'. As it resides in the Lungs, the Po is responsible for touch and skin sensations and it is nourished by the mother's Po through breast-feeding and touching. This explains the importance of touching in a baby's life: it not only establishes a bonding between mother and baby but it also physically nourishes the Po and therefore the Lungs.

Sleep scientist McKenna found that a sleeping mother and an infant share far more than a mattress. Their physiological rhythms in slumber exhibit mutual concordances and synchronicities that McKenna thinks are life-sustaining for the child. He says: "The temporal unfolding of particular sleep stages and awake periods of the mother and infant become entwined. On a minute-to- minute basis, throughout the night, much sensory communication is occurring between them." This is a clear confirmation of the connection between the mother's and the baby's Po.

a Po (from birth to about 2)

As we have seen, the Po is formed at conception and it derives from the mother. It is also responsible for the most basic physiological processes in the life of a new-born baby such as touching, crying and breast-feeding.

In my opinion, the life of a baby from birth to about 2 is dominated by the Po. Of course, the *Shen* is also present but it is still an immature kind of *Shen*. During the first two years of life, the baby and, later, toddler, need the feeding and touch from the mother: during such activities, the mother's Po is actually nourishing the baby's Po.

b Zhi (from 2 to 4)







Prom about 2 onwards, the toddler is beginning to form a concept of self as an autonomous individual, separate from his or her parents. As the *Shen* is still immature, the *Zhi* (Will-Power) manifests itself with increased assertiveness and a tendency for the toddler to want to contradict his or her parents all the time (the 'terrible twos'). As every parent knows, the toddler will say 'no'! much more frequently than 'yes'!

c Hun (from 4 to 6)

According to ancient beliefs, the *Hun* enters the body only after birth, in theory, three days after birth. It was 'imparted' by the father during a ceremony when the father gave the baby its name. Of course, we do not have to take this literally but these beliefs do show that the *Po* is Yin (compared to the *Hun*), it derives from the mother and is formed at conception; by contrast, the *Hun* is Yang in nature (compared to the *Po*), it derives from the father and is formed after birth. Also, the *Po* dies when the person dies and it returns to Earth; the *Hun* survives death and it returns to 'Heaven' (*Tian*).

The Hun is described as the 'coming and going of the Shen' and it gives the Shen creativity, inspiration, projects, life dreams, aims, and also artistic inspiration. In my opinion, the Hun dominates a child's life from the age of about 4 to about 6. During this time of life, the child is immersed in a world of the Hun, a world of fantasy where inanimate objects (such as dolls or teddy bears) come to life, a world of searching, imagination, and also artistic expression. At this age, every child is an artist. During this stage of life, it is normal for the Hun to prevail over the Shen because the Shen is relatively immature. In adults, if the Hun prevails over the Shen it gives rise to a somewhat manic behaviour.

It is for this reason that, in my opinion, it is so important to let the child express himself or herself in this world of the *Hun* and not try to force the *Shen* to mature too early (as it happens in countries where children start proper school at 4).

d Shen (from 6 to 11)

Prom the age of about 6, the child begins to leave the world of *Hun* and the *Shen* becomes more mature. The child's imagination does no longer run wild as it did before and a more rational view takes hold. This is therefore the best time for a child to start proper school. Of course, the child does not leave the world of the *Hun* entirely but the movement of the *Hun* is somewhat more restrained by the *Shen*.

e Yi (from 11 onwards)

It is only from about 11 onwards that the Yi starts to develop properly. The Yi is responsible for thinking, rational thinking, focussing in study and concentrating.

4 Aetiology, Pathology and Treatment according to Stages of Childhood

I use also another classification of the stages of childhood according to the prevailing aetiology, pathology and treatment methods.







a Infancy up to 2

During the early stage of life the baby's and toddler's life revolves entirely around nutrition and the digestive system. During this stage, the baby or toddler frequently suffers from Retention of Pood and, for this reason, whatever I am treating, I always add some digestive herbs to the prescription. The main aetiology at this stage of life is accumulation of Pood.

If the child has an atopic constitution, it is at this time that he or she will have atopic dermatitis.

b 2 to 4

From 2 to about 4, the child is prone to invasions of external Wind also because he or she starts to mix with other toddlers. At this stage, the child frequently catches upper respiratory or ear infections. When children were not immunized, at this stage of life they caught exanthematous infections, i.e. infections manifesting with skin eruptions (e.g. measles, German measles, chicken pox).

From a Western perspective, these skin eruptions are a manifestation of a cell-mediated immunity: as the skin eruptions appear, it means that the body's cells are fighting the bacteria or virus. From a Chinese perspective, these skin eruptions make the immune system mature and they also expel any Toxic Heat that the child may still carry from its life in the womb.

Most children's problems at this stage of life are due either to acute invasions of Wind which should be actively treated, or to a residual pathogenic factor following repeated invasions of Wind. The formation of a residual pathogenic factor is discussed under the remedy Resolve Phlegm.

c 4 to 7

In this stage of life, the Spleen becomes stronger and the child does not suffer so many digestive upsets as before (under normal circumstances). Invasions of external Wind are still common and so is the formation of residual pathogenic factors.

From a medical viewpoint, this is a 'golden' age of childhood because children have left behind the two aetiological factors of external Wind and Pood accumulation and, on the other hand, they have not yet entered the adult world characterized by emotional problems.

d 7 to 12

From 7 to about 12 the digestive system has completely settled down and the Spleen is much stronger. Also, the immune system is developed and invasions of exterior Wind are no longer so common as they were before.

However, at this stage of life emotional stress becomes more manifest due to pressures at school or to family situations.

Diagnosis of Children

The following is a brief summary of the salient points in children's diagnosis. For reasons of space, it is not possible to describe all aspects of the diagnostic process in children; I will therefore only highlight the main differences between adults and children in diagnosis.

1 Tongue Diagnosis

The main differences between adults and children in tongue diagnosis lie in the body colour and coating.

a Tongue-Body Colour

Children are more prone to redness of the tongue body than adults are because, as we have seen above, they are more prone to Heat. In particular, children are more prone to red points. For example, it is unusual for an adult to develop red points in the front third of the tongue as a manifestation of invasions of exterior Wind-Heat: in children, such finding is common. Indeed, frequently such red points appear in children even before any symptom develops.

When a child's tongue is presented with red points all over, it usually indicates Stomach- Heat. However, although a redness of the tongue and red points are common in children, we should not think that the tongue is not often pale. Children

do suffer from Cold too, especially in the Stomach and Intestines, and in such cases, the tongue is indeed pale.

b Tongue Coating

In children, the tongue coating tends to be thicker than in adults. However, the opposite is also true, i.e. a geographic tongue (when the coating is missing in patches) is relatively common in children, with a higher incidence of it among atopic children (Pig.5).

2 Pulse Diagnosis

a Pulse Rate

The pulse rate is naturally faster in children, and the younger they are, the faster it is. The following table gives guideline values of pulse rate (beats per minute) according to the age of the child.

Age	Pulse Rate		
Newborn baby	120-140		
1-year old	110-120		
4-year old	110		
8-year old	90		
14-year old	75-80		







It is important to keep the above values in mind, lest we erroneously diagnose Heat in a child purely on the basis of the pulse rate.

b Techniques for taking the Pulse

In my experience, the younger the child, the more difficult it is to take and to interpret the pulse. Indeed, in babies, I tend to disregard the pulse and diagnose mostly by other symptoms and signs.

When taking the pulse of a baby or a young child, one naturally needs to make allowance for the shortness of the pulse positions and one needs to use only one finger to feel all three positions. This is done by keeping the finger on the pulse and rolling the finger distally and proximally to feel the three positions. As mentioned above, this is not easy and I tend to concentrate more on the general pulse quality rather than on individual pulse positions.

3 Symptons

The following table from 'Paediatrics in Chinese Medicine' summarizes the main symptoms and pathology of each organ. Please note that, in this Chinese book, the pathology under the Liver is one of internal Wind in the context of febrile diseases. This is something that we are unlikely to see in our daily practice. I have therefore replaced this pathology with the much more common one of Liver-Qi stagnation and Cold affecting the Intestines.

Dosage of Little Treasures

The question of dosage of herbal remedies is a complex one for which there are no hard and fast rules. In many cases, it is a matter of trial and error; patients often find their own correct level of dosage. One thing is certain: barring a few toxic herbs (which we do not use), the rules governing the range of dosage of herbal remedies are much looser than those of drugs.

For example, if we take four times the stated dose of most painkillers we might suffer toxic reactions, but this would not be the case with most herbs. Even for drugs however, the question of dosage is far from being as 'scientific' and accurate as we are led to believe. Reaction to a drug varies enormously and unpredictably between individuals as plasma concentrations commonly vary by a factor of 5 or more.

One of the criticisms often levelled at herbal remedies is that, because they are not standardised, there is no way of saying how much of the remedy's active constituents a patient is taking, and therefore no way of adjusting the dose accurately. There are two basic faults in this argument: first of all, with drugs too, finding the correct dosage is often a matter of trial and error due to individual variations in reaction; secondly, and most importantly, herbal remedies containing whole plants act in a physiological rather than chemical way, more like a food than a drug.

Thus, adjusting the dosage of individual active constituents is not necessary: it is precisely when active constituents are isolated that herbal remedies cause side-effects and adverse reactions in the same way as drugs. Tor example, ephedrine causes many more side-effects than Ma Huang Herba Ephedrae, glycyrrhizinic add causes many more side-effects (water and sodium retention) than Gan Cao Radix Glycyrrhizae uralensis, etc.

Furthermore, since herbal remedies are intrinsically safer than drugs (in spite of the barrage of contrary opinions that have been bandied in the past few years), the therapeutic range is far broader than for drugs. Indeed, the harmful dosage of herbs is so high that it would be impossible to ingest in one day. There are, in fact, reports of adverse reactions to herbal remedies in people who used them (unsuccessfully) in suidde attempts. The difference between the therapeutic range of drugs and herbal remedies can be illustrated in a diagram; Fig. 11 shows herbal remedies on the left, drugs on the right.

Of course, there are toxic plants for which the dosage is crudal and the therapeutic range quite narrow (e.g. Lei Gong Teng Radix Tripterigii wilfordii, Huang Yao Zi Semen Dioscoreae bulbiferae, Ma Qian Zi Semen Strychni nux-vomica, etc.) but the Three Treasures, Women's Treasure and The Little Treasures lines do not contain any of these toxic herbs. Many factors influence dosage, i.e. the Lull or Empty character of the condition, chronic versus acute, the state of the digestive system. I am going to discuss only the adaptation of the dosage according to the age of the patient. It should be stressed that all the mentioned factors need to be taken into account in every case.

Modification of dosage according to age of the patient

Children need lower doses. A newborn baby should not be treated at all and it is preferable not to treat any baby under 6 months of age unless absolutely imperative. Infants and children up to 6 years old should have a third of a dose; children between 6 and 14 half a dose; after that, a full dose. With drugs, the dosage for children is now adjusted according to body surface rather than body weight. The average body-surface area of a 70-Kg human is about 1.8m². Thus, to calculate the dose for a child, the child's surface area is multiplied by the adult dose and divided by 1.8, giving the following table:

As indicated on the page before, babies under 6 months of age should not be treated at all and the above values are given only for reference.

The values of this table can be followed when prescribing herbal remedies too, although precision is less important here than for drugs. A simpler formula to calculate the dosage for children is as follows:

A simple formula to calculate the dosage for children is as follows:

$$\frac{\text{Age x Dose}}{\text{Age + 12}}$$

For example, if an adult dose is 6 grams per day, the dosage for a 6-year-old would be:

$$\frac{6 \times 6}{6 + 12} = 2 \text{ grams}$$

Dosage of The Little Treasures Remedies

The granules of *The Little Treasures* remedies are concentrated to the ration of 7:1. The recommended dosage varies according to age. The values below are broken down according to age group. Please note that the values below are only broad guidelines: the actual dose may be higher or lower according to the condition.

If the recommended dose is three times a day, this does not necessarily need to be given three times a day. For example, if a child is precribed 5 grams per day, he or she can take 3 grams in the morning and 2 grams in the afternoon.

There are optimum times for the administration of the remedies. First of all, it is best if they are taken away from food, i.e. at least 1/2 before or after food. The remedies that promote sleep or treat bedwetting are best administered in the afternoon and evening. The remedies that reach the Upper Burner (e.g. those for the sinuses, ears, tonsils and chest) are best given about 1 hour after food.

- 6 months to 1 year (do not use under 6 months): 0.5 gram once or twice a day
- 1-2 years: 1 gram once or twice a day
- 2-4 years: 2 grams once or twice a day
- 4-7 years: 2-3 grams once or twice a day
- 7-10 years: 3 grams two or three times a day

Action: Restore the descending of Lung-Qi, stop cough and asthma, expel Wind from the bronchi, tonify Kidney-Yang and the Kidney's Defensive-Qi portion.

Patterns: Lung-Qi not descending, Lung-Qi and Kidney-Yang deficiency.

Indications: Chronic allergic asthma, breathlessness, wheezing, history of eczema as a baby.

Explanation

This remedy is for allergic asthma in children. Allergic asthma associated with eczema in atopic children is due not to Phlegm (as the traditional view states) but to retention of Wind in the bronchi and a narrowing of the airways by Wind. The cause of this chronic retention of Wind in the bronchi occurs against a background of a deficiency of Lung-Qi and of the Wei-Qi system of the Kidneys. Although the remedy tonifies the Lungs and Kidneys, its main thrust is to expel Wind from the bronchi and restore the descending of Lung-Qi to alleviate asthma. Therefore, the remedy treats primarily the Manifestion (*Biao*) of the condition of asthma, not the Root (*Ben*).

I would recommend treating the Root of this condition with acupuncture by reinforcing points such as LU-7 Lieque, LU-9 Taiyuan, BL-13 Feishu, Du-12 Shenzhu, Ren-4 Guanyuan and BL-23 Shenshu.

Caution and contraindications

There are no particular cautions and contraindications associated with this remedy.

Action: Clear Lung-Heat, resolve Phlegm, restore the descending of Lung-Qi, stop cough.

Patterns: Phlegm-Heat in the Lungs.

Indications: Productive cough following an invasion of Wind (i.e. a common cold, influenza or an ear infection), yellow sputum, catarrh, thirst, restlessness, disturbed sleep, poor appetite.

Tongue: Sticky-yellow coating, possibly red or red in the front third (Lung area).

Pulse: Slippery-Rapid.

Explanation

This remedy is for an acute productive cough following an upper respiratory infection. This cough usually manifests with Phlegm-Heat. It is important to understand that this remedy is for the Qi Level within the context of the 4 Levels. At the Wei Level, the pathogenic factor is on the Exterior and the main symptoms are the simultaneous subjective feeling of cold (called 'aversion to cold') and objective hot feeling of the forehead to touch. Once the aversion to cold goes and the child feels hot, then the pathogenic factor has penetrated into the Qi Level and it is in the Interior.

This remedy therefore treats Phlegm-Heat in the Lungs at the Qi Level. By definition, this remedy is usually used only for a few weeks after which, either the Phlegm-Heat has been cleared, or, if not, a different remedy might be called for. This is often Resolve Phlegm.

Caution and contraindications

Obviously the herbs contained in this remedy are cold in energy and therefore they potentially injure the Spleen. However, this remedy treats only an acute cough and it therefore would be taken for a few weeks at the most, during which time it is unlikely to damage the Spleen.

Classical antecedent

Qing Qi Hua Tan Tang Clearing Qi and Resolving Phlegm Decoction.







Clear Radiance

Chu Shi Wei Ling Tang Eliminating Dampness Stomach 'Ling' Decoction

Action: Resolve Dampness, clear Heat, expel Wind from the skin.

Patterns: Damp-Heat and Wind in the skin.

Indications: Chronic eczema from Damp-Heat, non-eczematous dermatitis with red

papules, skin eruptions with vesicles, itching, disturbed sleep. Tongue: sticky-yellow coating.

Pulse: Slippery-Rapid.

Explanation

This remedy is for atopic eczema that usually starts very early in life, in the first few months of a baby's life. In my opinion, atopic eczema is due to retention of Wind and Damp-Heat in the skin and it occurs against a background of a deficiency of the Wei-Qi systems of the Lungs and Kidneys. Damp- Heat is the most common pathogenic factor present in atopic eczema in babies and small children. In eczema, a distinction is made according to the type of skin manifestations. Dry, red papules indicate Heat; skin lesions that ooze a fluid indicate Dampness: widespread red papules that move around and are very itchy indicate Wind. However, all Chinese dermatologists agree that, in eczema, there is always Dampness even if the skin does not ooze: the characteristic puffiness of the skin in eczema by itself denotes Dampness.

The remedy is aimed primarily at resolving Damp- Heat and eliminating Wind from the skin and it therefore treats primarily the Manifestation (Biao) of this condition. However, it does contain Bei Sha Shen Radix Glehniae and Tu Si Zi Semen Cuscutae to treat the Root (Ben), i.e. the deficiency of the Wei systems of Lungs and Kidneys

Caution and contraindications

This remedy has a cooling effect and it may therefore potentially injure the Spleen. However, this is only likely to occur if the remedy is given for a long time (e.g. over 6 months).

Classical antecedent

Action: Tonify and lift Qi of the Spleen and Kidneys, astringe, calm the Mind.

Patterns: Deficiency and sinking of Spleen- and Kidney-Qi.

Indications: Nocturnal enuresis, slightly weak and quiet child, possibly short-sighted, poor

appetite, tiredness.

Tongue: Pale.
Pulse: Weak.

Explanation

This remedy treats nocturnal enuresis by tonifying and lifting Spleen- and Kidney-Qi. It secondarily also clears Heat as this may be a secondary factor in this condition.

Caution and contraindications

There are no particular cautions and contraindications associated with this remedy.

Classical antecedent

Patterns: Chronic, residual Damp-Heat in the ears.

Indications: Chronic ear ache, 'glue ear', slight deafness, irritability, thirst, poor appetite,

disturbed sleep, propensity to new ear infections.

Tongue: Sticky-yellow coating.

Pulse: Slippery.

Explanation

This remedy treats residual Damp-Heat in the ears. Residual pathogenic factors are very common in children and are responsible for a wide variety of problems: the formation of residual pathogenic factors was discussed under the remedy Resolve Phlegm. Acute ear infections are common in children and they frequently leave the child with a residual Damp-Heat in the ears: this is more likely to happen when antibiotics are used. The presence of residual Damp-Heat predisposes the child to futher acute ear infections, thus setting a vicious circle.

Caution and contraindications

This remedy has a cooling effect and it may therefore potentially injure the Spleen. However, this is only likely to occur if the remedy is given for a long time.

Patterns: Lung-, Spleen- and Kidney-Qi deficiency.

Indications: Propensity to catching colds or ear infections, weak and quiet child, frequent

urination, poor appetite, tiredness.

Tongue: Pale.
Pulse: Weak.

Explanation

This remedy is a general tonic for children suffering from a deficiency of the Lungs, Spleen and Kidneys. This remedy can be given to strengthen the immune system in a child who is prone to acute upper respiratory infections. This remedy can also be given to a child after treating him or her successfully for asthma.

Caution and contraindications

There are no particular cautions or contraindications to the use of this remedy.

Action: Nourish Liver-Yin and Liver-Blood, nourish Heart-Blood, subdue Liver-Yang, calm the Mind, settle the Ethereal Soul (*Hun*), tonify the Intellect (*Yi*), strengthen the Mind (*Shen*).

Patterns: Liver-Blood and Liver-Yin deficiency, Heart-Blood deficiency, Liver-Yang rising.

Indications: Attention deficit hyperactivity disorder (ADHD) in children, inattention, hyperactivity, impulsiveness, poor concentration, always 'on the go', constantly in motion, dashing around touching or playing with whatever is in sight, talking incessantly, inability to sit still at dinner or during a school lesson or a story, running around the room, touching everything, fidgeting incessantly, inability to focus, getting bored with a task after only a few minutes.

Tongue: Possibly without coating.

Pulse: Rapid, Floating-Empty.

Explanation

In my opinion, the pathology of ADD revolves around the Heart, Liver and Spleen and their respective emotional-mental-spiritual faculties, i.e. the Mind (Shen), the Ethereal Soul (Hun) and the Intellect (Yi).

In general, we can say that both ADD and ADHD are characterized by a pathology of the both the Intellect (Yi) and Ethereal Soul (Hun). However, in ADD there is prevalence of an Intellect (Yi) pathology, while in ADHD there is more a pathology of Ethereal Soul (Hun). The Mind (Shen) is involved both in ADD and ADHD (Fig. 12).

The Mind is responsible for thinking, memory, emotional life, cognition, intelligence, wisdom and ideas. Therefore, it is obvious that the Mind is involved in the pathology of ADD and ADHD, but especially the former. In this disorder, the Mind is weakened and thinking, memory and concentration are all affected.



I believe the Ethereal Soul (Hun) plays a pivotal role in the pathology of ADD and ADHD (especially the latter). The Ethereal Soul is responsible for ideas, plans, projects, inspiration,







creativity. The Ethereal Soul is constantly searching and 'moving' and I believe that in ADD and ADHD (and especially the latter), there is an excess of such 'movement' of the Ethereal Soul. Children and adults suffering from this disorder find it difficult to focus and concentrate on one thing at the time because the Ethereal Soul's movement is excessive.

Crucial to this pathology is the relationship between the Mind and the Ethereal Soul: in ADD and ADHD, the movement of the Ethereal Soul is excessive and the Mind does not perform adequately its function of control and integration. Therefore, the excessive movement of the Ethereal Soul causes the impulsive, restless and chaotic behaviour in ADHD. Interestingly, the Ethereal Soul is responsible for artistic inspiration and children suffering from ADHD are often artistic.

The Intellect (Yi) of the Spleen is responsible for focussing, concentration and the ability to apply oneself to a job in hand, all qualities which are lacking in those suffering from ADD or ADHD (especially the former). Thus, a pathology of the Intellect (and therefore of the Spleen) is a definite feature of the pathology of ADD.

Please note that the Intellect is affected not only by a deficiency of the Spleen but also by Full conditions such as Dampness and/or Phlegm obstructing the Spleen (and therefore the Intellect). As always in pathology, a disorder may manifest with Full or Empty conditions.

A Heart deficiency is nearly always present in ADD and ADHD. Heart-Heat may especially cause ADHD but this is often combined with a deficiency of the Heart. This deficiency may involve Qi, Blood or Yin. Please note that Heart-Heat also stimulates the excessive movement of the Ethereal Soul.

Obstruction of the Heart by Phlegm (with or without Heat) may also be present in ADD; if there is Heat, then this condition is more likely to cause ADHD (Fig. 13).



The movement of the Ethereal Soul (Hun) may be excessive either because of a deficiency of Liver-Blood and/or Liver-Yin or because of Heat or Tire in the Liver. In ADHD, there is more likely to be Heat or Fire (Fig. 14).









The ADHD patient with Liver-Tire is confrontational and particularly difficult. A deficiency of the Spleen (usually of Qi or Yang) weakens the Intellect and is a feature of ADD. However, the thinking, focussing and concentration of the Intellect may also be impaired by Dampness and/or Phlegm affecting the Spleen (Fig.15).



Phlegm in the Brain is a common factor in ADD and ADHD. Remember that Phlegm may accompany both Full or Empty patterns: for example, Liver- and Heart-Fire with Phlegm or Spleen- and Heart-Blood deficiency with Phlegm. The remedy *Sino-Relief* resolves Phlegm.

Caution and contraindications

There are no specific cautions or contraindications to this remedy.

Action: Clear Lung-Heat, resolve Phlegm, restore the descending of Lung-Qi, stop cough.

Patterns: Residual Phlegm-Heat in the Lungs following an invasion of Wind (e.g. an acute

upper respiratory infection).

Indications: Indications: Productive cough that persists for weeks or months after an upper respiratory infection, yellow sputum, a feeling of oppression of the chest, poor appetite, irritability in younger children, disturbed sleep, catarrh.

Tongue: Red in the front third (Lung area), sticky-yellow coating.

Pulse: Slippery-Rapid.

Explanation

This clinical situation is caused by the retention of a residual pathogenic factor in the Lungs in the form of Phlegm-Heat. A residual pathogenic factor is formed usually at the Qi Level of an upper respiratory infection. This is the level following the Exterior stage of an invasion of Wind. An invasion of Wind at the Exterior level is characterized by the simultaneous presence of a subjective feeling of cold ('aversion to cold') and an objective feeling of heat of the forehead to the touch (or an actual fever).

If the pathogenic factor penetrates into the Interior, this usually is the Qi Level (in serious infections it may be the Ying level). At this level, the child usually recovers. He or she develops a productive cough and, with proper treatment, the Phlegm is eventually resolved and the child recovers.

In many cases however, the child appears to recover but a residual Phlegm stays in the Lungs, usually combined with Heat. This is due to various factors such as a weak constitution of the child, improper care, improper diet during the infection, and the use of antibiotics.

In fact, antibiotics frequently favour the formation of a residual pathogenic factor in the form of Phlegm. This is because they eliminate the bacteria, but they do not clear Heat or resolve Phlegm: they therefore give the parents the impression that the child is better (the fever abates) while, in fact, a residual Phlegm is settling in the Lungs.

Dr JFH Shen used to compare the action of antibiotics to shooting a burglar. Suppose we hear a noise from a burglar entering our house during the night. In this analogy, the 'burglar' is the







exterior pathogenic factor. We have two options: we may get up, make some noise and induce the burglar to leave (hopefully). This is the way of acting of Chinese medicine when it expels pathogenic factors, i.e. they are expelled without leaving a trace. The second option would be to arm ourselves, confront the burglar and shoot him: this also solves the problem of preventing a theft but we are left with a dead burglar in the house and we may face the law ourselves. This is the way of acting of antibiotics: they 'shoot' the bacteria (the burglar) but they leave a pathogenic factor behind (the dead burglar).

Antibiotics tend to favour the formation of Phlegm because they injure Stomach-Qi and Stomach-Yin: we can see this observing the effects of antibiotics on the tongue. They frequently (not always) caused the coating to fall off in patches: this indicates that they have injured Stomach-Qi and Stomach-Yin. The tongue goes back to normal after a few weeks. Thus, when I see a child with a geographic tongue (i.e. with the coating missing in patches), I always ask whether they are on antibiotics or have been on them recently (within a few weeks).

The formation of a residual pathogenic factor is very common in children, especially when antibiotics are used for an upper respiratory infection. A residual pathogenic factor may be retained in the lungs, sinuses, ears and throat: in this case, it is in the Lungs and it gives rise to a cough that persists for weeks or months.

The residual pathogenic factor also predisposes the child to further upper respiratory infections and if he or she is given antibiotics again, these will only reinforce the residual pathogenic factor giving rise to a vicious circle and an aggravation of the situation. In many cases, the child will then be (wrongly, in my opinion) diagnosed with 'asthma' and given bronchodilators and inhaled steroids.

This is a great pity as it will condemn the child to years of inhaled steroid use for something that is not really 'asthma' but simply an obstruction of the lung's airways by phlegm. Chinese medicine is very effective in these cases and it may save the child from years of inhaled steroids use.

Caution and contraindications

This remedy has a cooling effect and it may therefore potentially injure the Spleen. However, this is only likely to occur if the remedy is given for a long time (e.g. longer than 6 months).

Silent Night

Action: Nourish Liver- and Kidney-Yin, dear Heart-Heat and Liver-Heat, calm the Mind, settle the Ethereal Soul (*Hun*).

Patterns: Liver- and Kidney-Yin deficiency, Heart- Heat, Liver-Heat.

Indications: Disturbed sleep, difficulty in falling asleep, waking up during the night, crying at night in small children and babies, scary dreams.

Tongue: Without coating. Red if there Heat.

Pulse: Floating-Empty.

Explanation

This remedy promotes sleep by nourishing Liver- Yin and Heart-Blood. Liver-Yin and Heart-Blood house the Ethereal Soul (Hun) and the Mind (Shen). Both of these are responsible for the amount or quality of sleep we get.

The amount and quality of sleep depend of course on the state of the Mind (Shen). The Mind is rooted in the Heart and specifically in Heart-Blood and Heart-Yin. If the Heart is healthy and the Blood abundant, the Mind is properly rooted and sleep will be sound. If the Heart is deficient or if it is agitated by pathogenic factors such as Fire, the Mind is not properly rooted and sleep will be affected.

As always in Chinese medicine, there is an interrelationship between body and Mind. On the one hand, a deficiency of Blood or a pathogenic factor such as Fire may affect the Mind; on the other hand, emotional stress affecting the Mind may cause a disharmony of the Internal Organs.

If the disharmony of the Internal Organs, whether it is due to a Deficiency or an Excess, affects Blood and Essence, this affects the Mind. Since the Essence and Qi are the root of the Mind (the Three Treasures'), the Mind then has no residence and insomnia may result. The 'Simple Questions' in chapter 46 says: "When a person lies down and cannot sleep, [it means] the Yin organs are injured [so that] the Essence has no residence and is not quiet and the person cannot sleep."

As far as sleep is concerned, the Mind is not the only mental-spiritual faculty involved. The Ethereal Soul (Hun) also plays an important role in the physiology and pathology of sleep and the length and quality of sleep are related to its state. In particular, the Ethereal Soul controls dreaming and therefore dream-disturbed sleep is often due to a disharmony of the Ethereal Soul.







If the Ethereal Soul is well rooted in the Liver (Liver-Blood or Liver-Yin), sleep is normal, sound and without too many dreams. If Liver-Yin or Liver-Blood is deficient, the Ethereal Soul is deprived of its residence and wanders off at night, causing a restless sleep with many tiring dreams. Tang Zong Hai says: "At night during sleep the Ethereal Soul returns to the Liver; if the Ethereal Soul is not peaceful there are a lot of dreams." Another organ and mental-spiritual aspect influencing sleep are the Kidneys and the Will-Power (Zhi). I translate Zhi as 'Will-Power' but Zhi encompasses also other aspects of the psyche. The Zhi is the root of the Mind (Shen) and it controls memory and sleep. Thus, when the Kidneys and the Zhi are deficient, the person may sleep badly, in particular he or she may wake up frequently during the night.

Caution and contraindications

There are no particular cautions or contraindications associated with this remedy.

Classical antecedent

Suan Zao Ren Tang Ziziphus Decoction.

Patterns: Residual Damp-Heat in the head (sinuses, throat, adenoids and tonsils), Damp-

Heat in Stomach channel.

Indications: Catarrh, nasal voice, swollen adenoids, swollen and inflamed pharynx, swollen

tonsils, restlessness, markedly poor appetite, disturbed sleep.

Tongue: Sticky coating.

Pulse: Slippery.

Explanation

This condition is caused by retention of residual Damp-Heat in the head following an upper respiratory infection. This is a very common occurrence in children, often aggravated by the use of antibiotics for an upper respiratory infection.

The formation of a residual factor was discussed under the remedy Resolve Phlegm.

The retention of Damp-Heat in the head will make the child somewhat listless and cause a typically nasal voice. Dampness in the head and in the Stomach channel will also severely affect appetite so that the child lacks appetite and picks at the food.

Caution and contraindications

This remedy has a cooling effect and it may therefore potentially injure the Spleen. However, this is only likely to occur if the remedy is given for a long time.

Classical antecedent

Qing Yan Tang Clearing the Throat Decoction and Li Yan Cha Benefiting the Throat Tea.

Action: Release the Exterior, expel Wind-Heat, benefit the throat.

Patterns: Invasion of external Wind-Heat at the Wei Level.

Indications: Aversion to cold, shivers, fever (or forehead hot to the touch), sore throat,

swollen throat, swollen tonsils.

Tongue: Red sides (between the centre and the tip) and/or red front third. In severe cases, the tongue may have red points in these areas. The dosage can be adjusted according to the degree of redness of these areas and to the presence of red points: the redder these areas and the more red points there are, the higher the dose.

Pulse: Floating-Rapid. It may be Floating only on the Lung position.

Explanation

This corresponds to an acute upper respiratory infection with pharyngitis and tonsillitis; it will also help otitis media (ear infection).

It should be understood clearly that this remedy is purely for the Exterior stage of an invasion of exterior Wind, i.e. when the pathogenic factor is on the Exterior. The crucial symptoms and signs of this situation are the simultaneous presence of shivers (or a subjective feeling of cold with an acute onset) and an objective feeling of heat of the forehead to touch (or an actual fever).

The subjective feeling of cold is due to the obstruction of the Wei Qi in the space between skin and muscles: as the Wei Qi warms the muscles, when it is obstructed, the patient feels cold. The fever, or objective feeling of heat of the forehead to the touch, reflects the fight between the pathogenic factor and Wei Qi. Please note that, contrary to popular perception, the fever (or objective feeling of heat) is **not** due to the fact that it is Wind-Heat, as Wind-Cold also manifests with this sign.

Caution and contraindications

All the herbs in this remedy are cold in nature and they may therefore injure the Spleen with prolonged use. However, this will not happen as the remedy is given only for a short time by definition. As the remedy is specific for the Wei Level of an invasion of exterior Wind-Heat, the remedy is given only for a few days: after that, either the child has expelled the Wind and







recovered or the pathogenic factor has penetrated into the Interior in which case the child will need a different remedy.

Classical antecedent

Yin Qiao San Lonicera-Forsythia Powder.







Tummy Soothe

Bao He Wan Preserving and Harmonizing Pill

Xiang Fu Rhizoma Cyperi rotundi Sha Ren Fructus seu Semen Amomi Shan Zha Fructus Crataegi Lai Fu Zi Semen Raphani Gu Ya Fructus Oryzae germinatus Zhi Ke Fructus Aurantii Ban Xia Rhizoma Pinellliae preparatum

Action: Move Qi, dissolve Food accumulation.

Patterns: Liver-Qi stagnation, Qi stagnation in the Intestines, Retention of Food.

Indications: Abdominal pain and distension, colic in infants, constipation, irritability.

Tongue: Tongue: possibly red on the sides.

Pulse: Wiry.

Explanation

As discussed in the introduction, the Spleen and the digestive system in general are weak in newborn babies and they remain weak for at least 3-4 years. Under normal circumstances, the Spleen and the digestive system get gradually stronger as the child grows so that, by the time the child is about 7, the Spleen is much stronger. It follows therefore that small children are very prone to digestive problems and especially Retention of Food (called Accumulation in Chinese pediatrics), Qi stagnation and Cold in the Spleen and Intestines.

I stressed above 'under normal circumstances': in modern children these seldom occur. There are common factors which in modern children cause the digestive system not to become as strong as it should as the child grows. The most common aetiological factors are weaning too early, excessive consumption of cold foods (ice-cold drinks, ice cream, etc.), excessive consumption of greasy foods (chips or fries, etc.) and exposure to external cold through inadequate clothing.

The remedy *Tummy Soothe* is a variation of the well-known Bao He Wan *Preserving and Harmonizing Pill* which resolve Food accumulation. It has been modified with addition of herbs to move Qi and resolve Dampness.

Caution and contraindications

There are no particular cautions and contraindications associated with this remedy.

Classical antecedent

Bao He Wan Preserving and Harmonizing Pill.
